TRUCK AND AUTO IN COLLISION

PRISONERS LIFT VOICES IN LILTING ROUNDLAY

Unexpected Talent Developed in Song-fest at City Jails Last Night—In Court This Morning.

Prisoners of the East Grand Forks city jails whiled away the tedium of their incarceration last evening by singing selections from the war songs of the I. W. W., the libretto of which were parodies of popular airs. All were the usual Sunday night pick-up of the local police department.

Kittle Knutson, who cheerfully pleaded guilty to vagrancy Saturday, wielded the baton and exhorted the singers to lofty flights of artistry. Charles McIntyre found himself marooned on the high C, caused by injuries to his vocal chords which he claimed were sustained when he was assaulted by companions on the Point. Several of the prisoners had excellent voices, and their amusement was not disturbed by the police.

This morning, all were arraigned in Judge Robert Blair's court. With the exception of Kittleason, all pleaded guilty. They were remanded for hearing this afternoon.

Charles McIntyre and Pete Olson paid fines of \$5 each. W. H. Bullmoose, Ed. Stealy, Tom McCarthy, Pat Clark and Ed. McCarthy, penitentiary as a result of the night's revel, received suspended sentences, conditional upon their immediately getting back to their jobs. All claimed to have employment.

NORTH DAKOTAN ROBBED AND THROWN INTO RIVER

Minneapolis Men Invite Him to Take Auto Ride—Is Beaten Into Insensibility.

Minneapolis, Oct. 16.—Beaten into insensibility and robbed of \$90 by two young men who invited him to take an automobile ride with them, Carl Farrin, of Fargo, was thrown into the Mississippi river near the west end short line bridge by his assailants early today. When he was hurled down the river bank, Farrin struck on the brink of the stream

with his head and shoulders out of the water, where he was found by passersby.

The two men who robbed Farrin met the Fargo visitor at a hotel. He accepted the invitation to join them in a ride in a large touring car. The car was driven directly to the bridge where the attack occurred.

SWALLOWED BUTTON CAUSES GIRL'S DEATH AFTER 2 YEARS

St. Cloud, Minn., Oct. 16.—Tena Nees, 23 years old, swallowed a button two years ago. Until a short time ago the button, which had lodged in her throat, gave her little trouble. Recently, however, she found difficulty in swallowing. She was removed to a hospital for an operation and died before it could be performed.
