THE 1830 WOMAN.

Women today are constantly being accused of paying more attention than ever to dress and to the thousand and two nuances of the moment's fashion. But here is a fashion note from the New York Evening post of 1830:

"First Evening Dress—A gown composed of gros de Indes; the color a new and beautiful shade between lilac and lavender. Corsage uni, nearly concealed by Canzou en coeur, composed of white blond net, disposed a mille plis, and trimmed with a triple frill of the richest English blond lace, so arranged as to form a point in the center at the bottom of the waist before and behind; it is set on narrow, and with little fullness at the bottom of the waist, but broader, and with more fullness toward the shoulder. The canzou is cut round the upper part so as to come nearly, but not quite, to the throat, and the fullness is gathered into a row of blond jet-train lace. Sleeve a la Marie de Medicis, with blond manchettes. Head-dress, a crape hat trimmed on the inside of the brim with gauze ribbon disposed en papillon, with a bouquet of white roses placed in the center."

The real truth is that the women of 1830 were so taken up with important topics like farthingales, panniers, polonaises and pelouses that they never gave them had any attention to give such trifles as tail-bob, reform or civic welfare.


