"I don't know any more about when we are going home than you do. The latest rumor is that we are going home on the 19th. However, I don't take much stock in any of these rumors. In my opinion it will be a long time after the 19th when we pull out.

"Today and yesterday we received much better 'cats' than we have been receiving since our outpost and I feel more optimistic and better all around. Believe me, it makes some difference! I think I could whip a few Mexicans now and get a lot of this bad blood out of my system. However, it is not so bad but what it might be worse."

OLD PEOPLES' HOME IS AIM OF SOCIETY

Bethesda Association of Scandinavian Women, Plan Mass Meeting to Stimulate Interest.

To establish a home for the aged Lutheran people of the city, the Bethesda Association of Scandinavian Women, which was organized here nearly a year ago will hold a mass meeting by which they hope to get the ministers of the Lutheran churches of the city and the citizens interested in the project.

W.C.T.U. REPORTS SHOW SUCCESS

Rev. F. L. Watkins of Enforcement League Gives Address Friday Evening

Grafton, N. D., Oct. 21.—Rev. F. L. Watkins, secretary of the North Dakota Enforcement league, was the principal speaker at the Friday meeting of the W. C. T. U. convention in session in Grafton. Rev. Watkins, in his address before the convention, took up the liquor question and quoted statistics to show the results attained by the temperance union in North Dakota. The speaker declared that the liquor consumption in this state has been reduced to one-half gallon per capita, while in states where licensed saloons prevail, a per capita consumption of over 25 gallons is the result.

Mr. Watkins lauded the work of the temperance supporters but stated that much more remains to be done to eliminate liquor from the state and that activities must not be abandoned.

At the meeting held this morning, the reports of the various officials were read, including that of Mrs. Kate Watson, superintendent in North Dakota. The speaker declared that the liquor consumption in this state has been reduced to one-half gallon per capita, while in states where licensed saloons prevail, a per capita consumption of over 25 gallons is the result.

UNCLE SAM CAN'T REACH FRAUDS IN FARM LOAN

Promoters of Joint Stock Banks who Are Tricky Do Not Come Under the Federal Laws.

Washington, Oct. 21.—Promoters of fraudulent schemes for organizing joint stock banks in the new rural credits system are not reached by the federal fraud and conspiracy laws, according to an opinion given the farm loan board today by Attorney General Clegg. In reply to the board's query on the subject by ruling that the alleged frauds apparently fell within the scope of state laws.
