The United States visible increased 804,000 bushels for the past week and the total is now 50,228,000 bushels, a year ago today it was 50,514,000 bushels.

Weather in the Argentine was clear, calm and hot. Buenos Aires wheat closed strong, 41-2 to 6-4c higher.

Clearance of wheat and flour for today equaled 1,234,000 bushels. Total world's shipments for the past week were 10,112,000 bushels.

Considerable Ground Lost Was Gained—Dime Advance.

South St. Paul, Oct. 23.—A crop of porkers which measured up larger than that with which dealers had to handle the previous week as well as that of the same week a year ago found good clearance here during the period just closed and except for the first two days of the week the offerings were closed out higher than they were a week previous.

The market on hogs near the close worked as the scheduling higher than it was at the close of the week before, \$9.70 being given for stock which landed at top of the sales list as compared with \$9.50 at the finish of the preceding period.

Average cost Saturday was \$9.55 compared with \$9.22 at the finish of the previous week's dealing.
