Uruguay Has Crisis That Grows Serious

Montevideo, Oct. 28.—Dr. Juan Jose Amasaga, minister of commerce and industry, has resigned.

The ministers of the interior and of justice also have handed in their resignations.

The state department at Washington was informed on August 15 by American minister Jeffery at Montevideo that the Uruguayan cabinet had resigned because of the defeat of the government in the election. A dispatch from Montevideo September 4 said a new cabinet had been formed.

Martin Martinez, a dispatch from Montevideo under date of October 26, said, had resigned as Uruguayan minister of finance. He took office with the new cabinet in September.

TEUTONS IN HERSOVA; RUSSIANS BEGIN NEW GALICIAN OFFENSIVE

The attack failed with heavy losses to the Russians, the announcement asserts.

Teutons Launch Attack. Petrograd, Via London, Oct. 28.—Austro-German forces launched a series of violent attacks against the Russian-Rumanian position on both banks of the river Hystrina in the region of Dornawatra yesterday. It is officially announced today, compelling the Russian advanced posts to abandon two heights.

Teutonic Pressure Lessens. London, Oct. 28.—The Teutonic pressure against the Rumanians and Russians in Transylvania appears to have stopped definitely, says a telegram received by the Wireless Press today from Bucharest. The Rumanians and Russians, according to the message, are taking the initiative in operations in this field. It is estimated by Rumanian military officials that the losses of the Austro-Germans in Transylvania have reached a total of \$9,000.

Rumanians Claim Victories. Bucharest, Oct. 28.—(Via London.) Rumanian troops on the Moldavian frontier won another success over the Austro-German forces, the war office announced today. In the Trotus valley they recaptured Piscal from which vicinity the Teutonic troops are feeling in disorder.

"In the Uzul valley the Rumanian attack was successful and ten officers and 900 men, together with five machine guns and a large quantity of

A gold nugget weighing 14 pounds was recently found in the Chuqualgullo mines near La Paz, Bolivia. Even larger nuggets than this have been found in that country.

Tin ore from Bolivia is now being smelted for the first time in this country, at Perth Amboy, New Jersey. Formerly England and Germany smelted this ore.

China is building 1,100 miles of modern railroad with American capital, aided by American engineers. American equipment will be used throughout. This road is to cost \$100,000,000.

Argentina needs sugar. The government has just authorized the admittance, duty free, of 35,000,000 pounds of refined sugar.

Brazil is becoming a meat-exporting nation. This year she will export about 50,000 tons of frozen beef.

A castor-oil factory has just opened in Carmen, Colombia, and its first shipment of 10,000 pounds was bought by an American drug house. India formerly supplied this medicine.

Costa Rica now manufactures and exports Portland Cement, a quarry of appropriate stone having been recently discovered. She also has sent her first shipment of manganese ore to the United States.

President Menocal of Cuba, president of the American-Cuban Sugar company, has decided to divide \$500,000 among the employes of this concern, in appreciation of services during the past year.
