WE DO NOT THINK OF PEACE, THEY SAY

Hint That Russia May be the First Allied Power to Crumble Under Blows.

Berlin, Oct. 31. (By wireless to Sayville, N. Y.)—The situation is as good as possible and all will be well in the future.

General Von Ludendorff here added: "We do not think of peace. We are absolutely decided to continue the war as is shown with sufficient clearness by the measures of the allied (German) army commands."
