LAD CLAIMS WAS SHOT BY OFFICER

Bullet Took Effect in Big Toe of Left Foot—Not Serious.

Harry Flint, the young son of Mr. and Mrs. L. E. Flint, 212 North First street, was accidentally shot last night as the result of Halloween escapades of a number of lads with whom he was thought to be allied.

The lad claims that he was shot by Officer Keller as he was fleeing with two other lads, Herman Eiky and Edwin Anderson, and that the cause of the commotion was the activity of a gang of boys near the school house, of which the officer thought he was a member.

In an interview today, Mr. Keller denied any knowledge of the affair, and stated that while patrolling policemen fired a number of shots during the evening to scare away youthful prowlers, all were fired at random and with no serious intent.

The wound is not serious, and young Flint is undergoing treatment. Local Halloween celebrants distinguished themselves last night for the first time in which the occasion was celebrated. Small boys gathered and performed the usual pranks.

"Frighten" staid residents with trick-or-treats and strange noises, and held mysterious secret gatherings, but abstained from committing any depredations to property.

Three extra policemen had been added to the force for the occasion, and with the regular patrol kept strict guard throughout the city. In the afternoon, several bicycles taken from the streets were found in the woods, and are now awaiting their owners at the city hall.

An attempt to place one of the large wagons of the East Grand Forks brewery in the vestibule of the high school building was frustrated. Later in the evening, a number gathered at the school building in an attempt to rush the premises and discover the "cats" thought to have been left from the party given the faculty by the "Women's club" the same evening.

This attempt also failed, and disheartened, apparently by the lack of success, the youthful prowlers of the night departed for their several homes.

The police department anticipated an unusual run of drunks, but when Judge Blair arrived at his office in the city hall this morning, he found but one who had managed somehow to secrete himself from his fellows and held a convivial little Halloween party all by himself.
