League of Nations Plan to be Pushed After the Election

New York, Nov. 2.—At a dinner to be given in this city on November 24 "to consider a program for a permanent league of nations to become effective at the close of the present war," an aggressive speaking campaign through the United States to explain the objects sought by the league to enforce peace will be opened. William H. Taft, president of the league, will preside at the dinner. The United States have been divided into seven districts in which governors and other leading public men are taking part. 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Tell Us, Woodrow-- Which Nation Was it?

Woodrow Wilson's appeal for re-election is based on the claim, "He kept us out of war." If he really has "kept us out of war" he should have the credit for it, but if he has not, that fact should be known so that we can consider the issues of the campaign and the claims of the candidates on their merits.

Did he keep us out of war with Mexico?

That's the most ridiculous assumption of all. The American people want peace. Wilson knows they want peace. That's why he's making his appeal for re-election on the plea that he "kept us out of war." He hopes to blind the American people to the fact that the whole DRIFT of his MEDDLING POLICY IS TOWARD WAR.

Wilson has not kept us out of war.

Wilson has GOT US INTO WAR WITH MEXICO by his needless meddling, because he REFUSED TO LEAVE MEXICO ALONE, because he BLUNDERED in everything he tried to do in Mexico. We have 100,000 men on the border to save us from invasion and an INVADING ARMY OF FIFTY THOUSAND MORE IN MEXICO. The soil of Mexico is drenched with the blood of Americans.
