Lannin of this city, former owner of the club, who announced the sale at a dinner given to the new owners and newspaper men, said the papers had been signed less than half an hour before. The price was not stated, both parties having agreed to keep silence on that point.

Mr. Frazee and Mr. Ward are both identified with theatrical interests, the former being principal owner of the Cort theater of Chicago and the Longacre theater of New York. The new owners gave few details as to definite plans for the club, but said: "When we went into this we did not buy a cheap team. We bought champions. We were interested in the club only because they were champions and would not have considered them otherwise."

Mr. Frazee will take direct charge of the team's affairs, it was said. The Red Sox are at present without a manager. William Carrigan, who has guided the team for the last three years, having announced his retirement at the conclusion of the world's

## U. S. IS AT WAR NEWS SUPPRESSED; MARINES KILLED

New York, Nov. 2.—The killing of two United States marine officers in a battle in Santo Domingo, with which republic this country has been at war for many months, has leaked through the strict military censorship which the Wilson administration has been able to throw about its military operations in Santo Domingo. The war with Santo Domingo began on May 6. More than 100 Santo Domingans have been killed and probably a fourth as many Americans, although the administration has succeeded in concealing the facts except when officers have been killed.

London, Nov. 2.—Premier Asquith told the house of commons today, in reply to a question from Arthur Lynch, that the government would introduce a bill providing for the removal from the peerage "of those members of the house of lords, for instance, German princes, who now are in arms against the allies."

## REFERENDUM ON LEGISLATION

**MILL TAX FOR ELEVATORS.**  
I, Thomas Hall, secretary of state of the state of North Dakota, acting under authority of the amendment to section 25 of article 2 of the constitution of the state of North Dakota, proposed by the Twelfth and Thirteenth Legislative assemblies, adopted by the people at the general election held on Nov. 2nd, 1914, and reported by me to the Fourteenth Legislative assembly, do hereby certify that, pursuant to the provisions of the act of the secretary of state of petitions containing the signatures of ten per cent of the legal voters of a majority of the counties of the state of North Dakota, for the general election to be held on Nov. 7th, 1916, chapter 194 of the Session Laws of 1916, which repeals the mill tax for terminal elevators and in lieu thereof makes an appropriation of \$1,000.00 therefor.
