THOMPSON LAD IN MOTORCYCLE CRASH

Son of Prominent Resident of That Village Runs Into Gravel Wagon Last Evening.

Floyd Smith, son of Mr. and Mrs. H. P. Smith of Thompson was painfully injured last evening when the motorcycle which he was riding, crashed into a sand wagon a short distance from that city last evening.

Young Smith had no lights on his machine and was unable to see the wagon in time to prevent a collision.

A Grand Forks physician was called and cared for the lad. His injuries are not considered serious, but he received many cuts and bruises.

MANY VOTERS CAST BALLOTS

Over 150 Votes Already Cast—Auditor to Keep Office Open Evenings.

Beginning this evening and continuing until November 7, the office of County Auditor Hans Anderson will be kept open evenings, until 8:30 o'clock for the accommodation of voters who will not be in the city on election day and who wish to cast ballots by taking advantage of the absent voters law.

The demand for absent voters ballots this year has been large and already 155 votes have been returned to the county auditor's office. Up until the time of opening ballots, it will be possible to vote by means of the absent voters ballot.

By appearing in person at the office of the auditor, voters who will not be in their own precinct on election day and who will be unable to return, may now cast their vote.

GOSSIP BRINGS ARREST OF AN INNOCENT MAN

Thompson Resident Leaves for Two Days' Visit—Nabbed for Jumping Small Board Bill.

Arthur Peterson of Thompson will not be taken before a court of justice to answer to a charge of jumping a board bill, for which he was arrested at Hillsboro, Tuesday on a warrant issued by Mrs. Christine Simon, proprietor of a Thompson hotel.

Peterson, for 15 years has made his home at Thompson and for many years has stayed at the hotel managed by Mrs. Simon. On Monday evening he left for Hillsboro for a two-day visit on business. Gossip spread the report that he would not return. A small board bill had been unseated before his departure and the warrant resulted.

He was returned to Thompson by Deputy Sheriff Stewart where differences were immediately righted and he again occupied his regular apartment.

"The entire affair was a mistake," said Peterson today. "I left enough personal property at Thompson to settle the account many times over and I had no intention of remaining away."
