MURDERER IS STILL AT LARGE

No Clue Obtained Regarding Murder of Carl Maier Near This City.

Beulah, N. D., Nov. 6.—The murderer of Carl Maier, well known and popular man of this town, who was shot and fatally wounded while on a public highway near here, is still at large. All efforts of a posse have proved unavailing. Every clue is being followed with persistence.

A coroner's jury turned in a verdict of manslaughter by an unknown assailant.

No motive for the crime has been unearthed and authorities are at a loss to account for the action of the murderer. The shooting was done by a .30.30 rifle carried by Maier.

Marks on the road show that a struggle ensued and it is presumed the man came upon Maier without warning, wrested the gun from his hands and then shot him, making his getaway on horseback.

The posse will continue their hunt until results have been obtained, according to the sheriff of this county.

TEACHER RUN DOWN BY AN AUTOMOBILE

Minot, N. D., Nov. 6.—Mary Powers, teacher of the East school in the Surry school district, while riding her pony from school to Surry, was run down and seriously injured by an automobile. The girl was riding close to a fence when the car came down the road at break neck speed. It ran into the horse and knocked the animal down while the girl was thrown a considerable distance. She received several bad cuts on her head and face. The driver of the machine, it is said, bound up the girl's head and then, fearing the consequences of his carelessness, drove away, leaving Miss Powers lying by the roadside.

She later regained consciousness and was able to mount her pony and ride home, but is at the present time under a doctor's care.

"Father of Prohibition" in Danger of Defeat For Return to Bench

Fargo, N. D., Nov. 6.—Money that A. F. Cole will be elected judge of the Third district in opposition to Chas. A. Pollock, has few takers in Fargo.

The judicial contest, one of the hottest ever staged, has developed remarkable features, and it is freely predicted that Mr. Cole, whose candidacy prior to the primaries was not taken seriously, will defeat Mr. Pollock.

Judge Pollock has been on the bench for a great many years. His friends have sought to show that Pollock's defeat would be seized upon by the liquor forces of the nation as indicating that North Dakota is backwards in prohibition matters, Judge Pollock being regarded as the "father of prohibition" in this state.

An interesting side light is the attitude of Rev. E. E. Saunders of Mapleton, state secretary of the Prohibition party, who is campaigning for Mr. Cole.

ESCAPED PRISONER RETURNED TO JAIL

Williston, N. D., Nov. 6.—Lewis Olson, who escaped from the county jail here a year ago when the doors were unlocked by a boy in charge of the sheriff and awaiting transportation to the state training school, is now occupying a cell in the jail again.

Olson was arrested at Conrad, Mont., on information furnished by the local sheriff and was returned to this city by Deputy Sheriff Strom. Olson was under sentence of one year in the state penitentiary for burglary at Ray when he took his opportunity to escape. He now faces the additional charge of breaking jail.

INJURED MAN MAY RECOVER

Williston, N. D., Nov. 6.—Sigurd Gellerstedt, who was shot and seriously injured by Carl Lindquist at the T. J. Stenjem farm north of the city a week ago, probably will recover, according to doctors. Gellerstedt's wounds are rapidly healing and, according to the physician, the danger of infection is practically past.

The bullet which hit the man passed through his arm without fracturing the bone, through his right lung and broke the spinal column near which it lodged.

Lindquist is still in the county jail awaiting hearing on a charge of assault with intent to do bodily harm. The final charge will depend on the outcome of Gellerstedt's injuries.

The shooting was the result of a fight over a land deal in which Gellerstedt claims to have paid for Lindquist's wife. When Gellerstedt would not give Lindquist money for the land he was shot by the latter.

In spite of the opinion of some salesmen to the contrary several weeks ago, the call for breeding ewes continued throughout the week and there is every prospect, it was said at the close, that it will continue for some time. Only native stock was

available much of the time for filling orders and there was a fairly good shipment to country's points. Any price around \$7.15 was enough to transfer much of the property offered in this section. A big lot sold late in the period at \$7.25 and there was a heavy sale at the middle of the week at \$8.25. Both transactions covered western stock.

In the feeder market not so much

activity was reported although salesmen hold many orders for such stock. No change in the schedules which are posted for this stock were reported at any time during the week.

Sheep and lamb prices were steady with a handful of stock here Saturday. One of the week's big features developed late Friday when packers bought a band of 2,433 western wethers averaging 109 pounds at \$8.10.


