

WILSON WINS ON THE FIRST COUNT

Republican Leaders Refuse to Concede His Election on the Unofficial Returns

EVACUATION OF CHIHUAHUA CITY IS LOOKED FOR

Carranza Troops Moved to Juarez—Gonzales Denies the Report.

GARRISON MAY NOT STICK TO CARRANZA

His Paper Dollar Drops to One Cent in Value—Troops Uneasy.

El Paso, Tex., Nov. 10.—A special train has arrived at Juarez with 600 Carranza troops aboard. American army officers believe this to be the beginning of the evacuation of Chihuahua City by General Trevino.

General Gonzales in Juarez declared the troops are being sent north for duty in western Chihuahua, denying that Chihuahua City is to be evacuated.

El Paso, Texas, Nov. 10.—Ten wealthy British residents of Chihuahua, and half of their number women, arrived at Juarez last night with other refugees.

While Chihuahua City is still calm, it was learned that some apprehension was felt over the loyalty of the garrison. General Trevino was credited with an effort to raise silver money to pay the troops.

Nothing was known in Chihuahua City of the fate of the Americans of Parral and Matamoros when the train left there today.

800,000 WOMEN CAST BALLOTS IN ILLINOIS

Majority Outside of Chicago Were for Hughes for President.

Chicago, Nov. 10.—Women of Illinois cast total vote last Tuesday of more than 800,000. It was expected today complete returns would show that total of newly enfranchised women who voted would exceed \$50,000 and might go even higher.

Total vote for president from 101 Illinois counties outside of Cook, was Wilson 484,898, Hughes 328,588. Unofficial figures from Cook county gave Wilson 374,560 and Hughes 421,022. Hughes plurality in the state, 175,458.

In Pivotal States

Errors in New Hampshire. Concord, N. H., Nov. 10.—Certified returns from 286 precincts out of 294 in New Hampshire give Hughes 72,722; Wilson 42,616. Hughes' plurality 107.

Secretary of State Bean, announcing this tabulation, did not include any Wilson votes from Ward, two of Keen, which had reported to the press that Wilson electors received 185, or from which two of Keen reported gave Wilson 389 votes in the press figures.

Wilson 3,170 in California. San Francisco, Nov. 10.—Rechecked totals from several counties gave Wilson no change in total number of precincts, 5,438 out of a total of 5,850 precincts; Hughes, 463,582; Wilson, 465,752. Wilson's plurality, 2,170, a gain of 40 over previous totals from the same number of precincts.

In West Virginia. Charleston, W. Va., Nov. 10.—With 89 precincts missing, Hughes is leading by 1,134.

Minnesota for Hughes. St. Paul, Minn., Nov. 10.—With hardly 50 precincts to hear from Hughes plurality in Minnesota shortly after noon was 72.

Fred Wheaton, chairman of the Democratic state central committee, still insisted, however, "We feel sure of Minnesota for Wilson."

The vote of 2,133 guardians at the border, to be counted November 15, under the law, is expected to be an important factor in the final result.

Canadian Railroad Men Want 8-hour Law

Similar to One in U. S. (Herald Special Service.) Winnipeg, Man., Nov. 10.—Canadian railway men will urge the passage of an eight-hour bill, such as that obtained some time ago in the United States.

The time is not opportune to press this matter, but as soon as an allied victory has been definitely established it will be taken up by the Brotherhood of Railway Trainmen.

This is the message that James Murdock, president of this organization, gave out today.

Mr. Murdock refused the claim made that the C. P. R. threatened strike had been brought about by the success of the trainmen in the United States in securing the eight-hour day. He stated that because of patriotic reasons a similar move on the part of the Canadian trainmen had been postponed.

STEEN LEADS CASEY BY 82 VOTES WITH LESS THAN 40 PRECINCTS OUT

According to figures compiled by the Nonpartisan league headquarters at Fargo at 8:30 o'clock this afternoon, from 36 to 40

small precincts yet to be heard from, the returns in state treasurer contest give Steen 49,048, Casey 48,966, a plurality of 82 votes for Steen.
