WARD COUNTY COURT WILL BEGIN TUESDAY

Large Number of Criminal Cases Will Come Up—Peoples Case Will Be Tried.

Minot, N. D., Nov. 13.—Ward county district court will convene at the court house Tuesday morning and a large number of criminal cases will be tried during the term.

There are seven felony cases on the calendar. Among the most important cases is that of Claude Peoples, charged with the murder of Frank Grigg at a dance in the negro section of the city a few weeks ago.

DEVILS LAKE NEW ABATTOIR OPENS

Devils Lake, N. D., Nov. 13.—The new abattoir of this city was opened for the first time for business today. "Open house" was held for inspection today and real business will begin tomorrow. The law requires that after December 1 all butchers and meat dealers must use the plant for killing animals for meat, or having them inspected before killing.

Today automobiles were run from the city hall to the abattoir to carry every one interested in inspecting the new plant. A large number of people went through the place.

CARRINGTON MAN LOSES HIS SECOND ELEVATOR BY FIRE

Carrington, N. D., Nov. 13.—Fire destroyed two elevators belonging to T. H. Cousin within a month. The last one to be burned was at Guppli, four miles north of Carrington. The blaze was started when Harry Hale, manager of Cousin, entered the office of the building, while the room was full of gas fumes, and struck a match. In an instant the office was a mass of flames, which soon spread to the rest of the structure. The elevator contained 5,000 bushels of oats, some barley and some wheat at the time and the loss is estimated at \$12,000, partially covered by insurance.

ROUTE TRAIL THROUGH MINOT

Minot, N. D., Nov. 13.—G. E. GERMAN SUBMARINE SANK COLUMBIAN

Report from Paris Identifies the Sub which Destroyed American Vessel—Two Norwegian Ships Sank.

Paris, Nov. 13.—A wireless dispatch from Madrid says that it was a German submarine which sank the American steamship Columbian.

According to this information the Columbian encountered the submarine Nov. 8 during a violent tempest. The submarine compelled the Columbian to interrupt her voyage and lie under surveillance until Nov. 8. When the storm subsided the dispatch says the submarine ordered the crew to abandon the ship and then sank her.

The dispatch also says that the Norwegian steamships Balto and Fordalen were destroyed in the same manner Nov. 9. (A report of the sinking of these steamships was received from London Saturday night.)

TO CONVOY GREEK SHIPS

French Admiral Assures Government of Friendly Intention—Not on Mission of Conquest.

Athens, Nov. 13.—In connection with the differences which have arisen between the Greek government and the entente allies in regard to the use of Greek warships for patrolling operations, Vice Admiral Du Fournet, commander of the Anglo-French naval forces gave assurances today that the French had come to Greece not as conquerors but as friends and that he was ready to convoy with units of the allied light squadron Greek ships bound for Saloniki.
