## SORLIE NEED NOT PAY FOR INJURIES

### Supreme Court Reverses Decision of Trail County in Injury Suit.

Bismarck, N. D., Nov. 15.—O. J. Sorlie, unsuccessful candidate for the Republican nomination for lieutenant governor at the June primaries, need not pay the assessment of \$2,500 levied against him in the Trail county district court for the loss of Arvid Nordberg's car, which was lost as a result of a collision between the Nordberg motorcycle and the Sorlie automobile in Trail county July 12, 1914.

Nordberg, according to the evidence, was speeding in one direction and Sorlie in the other on a country road. Sorlie started to turn out, but did not succeed in clearing the highway before Arvid crashed into him. Arvid's injuries necessitated the amputation of a leg. He brought action against Sorlie in the Trail county district court, before Judge Cooley, charging negligence upon the part of Sorlie, and he recovered a verdict for \$2,500.

## FOOD PROBLEM BEFORE DUMA

### Supply Channels Must be Reorganized—Must Help the People.

Petrograd, Nov. 15.—(Via London.)—The food situation and the problem of reorganizing the present supply channels, which have proved inadequate to meet the needs of the population, are the principal questions which will occupy the attention of the duma, which has resumed its sessions, after four months' adjournment.

Since the last session, the whole supply question has become of paramount importance and the press and public are unanimous in demanding some immediate action that will allow the people to benefit from the plentiful resources of the country.

The present conditions are to be traced chiefly to lack of transportation facilities and to speculation. Speculation has promptly met with punishment whenever the offenders have been apprehended and various steps have been taken to increase the means of transporting supplies from the food centers to the large cities.

The duma is expected to express itself in the early part of the session on the question of the advisability of transferring the management of supplies from the ministry of agriculture to the minister of the interior.

Another eagerly awaited feature of the session is the declaration by Polish members of the duma regarding Germany's offer of independence to that part of Russian Poland occupied by German troops. A large number of prominent Poles, who are exiled

## REPORT BELGIAN CITIES LOSING ALL ABLE MALES

### 18,500,000 POUNDS OF SUGAR BEET SEED IS IMPORTED

London, Nov. 15.—Special dispatches from Rotterdam dated Sunday say the deportations of Belgians continue daily on a large scale. Antwerp and Ghent, the dispatches say, are being slowly denuded of able-bodied males. Sixteen thousand already have left Ghent.

The men deported from Ghent have been almost exclusively the unemployed class, but elsewhere, the dispatches say, and especially in Antwerp, many workers were taken. It is said deportations from Brussels will begin today.

Washington, Nov. 15.—Importation of sugar beet seeds into the United States in the nine months ended with September, was 18,500,000 pounds—broke all previous records, according to a department of commerce statement today. This exceeded by more than a million pounds imports in the calendar year 1915-1914 and were almost twice as much as in the full year 1912.

Russia is now the chief source of supply, whereas prior to the war Germany held the bulk of the trade. Total imports of sugar beet seeds in the fiscal year ended June 30 were 8,042,490 pounds, of which Russia furnished 5,811,946 pounds.

## WIDOW FLAGLER BUYS \$1,000,000 SITE FOR A HOME

### New York, Nov. 15.—Mrs. Henry M. Flagler, widow of the railroad magnate, has taken title to ground on Upper Fifth avenue valued at \$1,000,000.

The site is in the fashionable residential section, and it is understood that Mrs. Flagler will build a mansion on it and make this city her home. Mrs. Flagler is reputed to be worth between \$60,000,000 and \$70,000,000.

## BORDEN DENIES HE INTENDS TO RESIGN

### Ottawa, Ont., Nov. 15.—In view of rumors that Premier Borden was about to retire, an official statement was issued at the premier's office today declaring that all such rumors are "absolutely destitute of foundation" and that they are purely "imaginative."

The announcement said that the prime minister deems it his duty to remain at his post until after the close of the war and has no thought of accepting any other position in Canada or Great Britain.
