EFFICIENCY COMMISSION FOR THE STATE

Comprehensive Measure Has Been Outlined for Legislature.

Bismarck, N. D., Nov. 18.—North Dakota is to have an economy and efficiency commission, if Chairman Packard of the state tax commission, can prevail upon the fifteenth legislative assembly to adopt a bill which he has framed.

Fourteen states have already named commissions of this nature for the study of the organization and administration of state governments.

The powers of the commission are practically unlimited. Any public officer or employe or private citizen whose testimony the commission may desire may be subpoenaed to appear before it.
