

INSIST THAT GERMANY SUNK TWO TRANSPORTS

Berlin, Nov. 20.—(By wireless to Sayville)—"The German admiralty on November 15 reported," says the Overseas News Agency, "that a German submarine, eight miles west of Malta, sank a 12,900 ton hostile transport sailing under convoy. The British admiralty declared this report to be incorrect since no transport but the liner Arabia was sunk without warning by a German submarine November 6 at a point 300 miles east of Malta.

CHRISTMAS BOXES FOR U.S. REGULAR SOLDIERS

Washington, Nov. 20.—A nationwide collection of Christmas boxes for the 50,000 regular soldiers in Mexico and along the border was announced by Red Cross headquarters here yesterday in letters to all its 250 chapters in the United States. This is planned as a national testimony of gratitude for the work done during the past year by the regulars who belong to the whole country and who do not have the attention national guardsmen get from folks at home.

Quebec, Canada, Nov. 20.—Every province in Canada but Quebec is now in the dry column, and the forces of prohibition are preparing for a vigorous campaign to make it unanimous. Figures have been printed by the anti-saloon forces here to show that the jails have been emptied in Manitoba so rapidly under the "dry" regime that it has been necessary to hire men to clean them. They produce police court records to prove that crime has been reduced 82 per cent in the same province and that the police force has been materially reduced.

Supreme Court Decisions

From Burlington County. The C. L. Merrick company, a corporation, plaintiff and appellant, vs. Minneapolis, St. Paul & Sault Ste. Marie Railway company, a corporation, defendant and respondent.

right of the railway company to reopen the case by appropriate proceedings, if, after adequate trial it thinks it can prove more clearly than at present the confiscatory character of the rates for coal.

Held, that such prior decisions are as to defendant railway company res judicata upon the issue there determined as to the confiscatory or non-confiscatory character of the rates as applied to the facts there considered, and such decisions are in no way affected by the later decision of the supreme court of the United States above cited, which involved only issues arising out of new facts subsequently occurring. (See 236 U. S. 555, 59 L. Ed. 735.)

Appeal from the district court, Burlington county, W. C. Crawford, J. From a judgment in defendant's favor, plaintiff appeals.
