Officers Without Practical Experience—Commissary is Very Poor.

Berlin, Nov. 20.—(Via London).—Rumania's failure to withstand the attack of the Austro-Hungarian army is to be ascribed, according to Joseph Wirth, correspondent of the Lokal Anzeiger, principally to the lack of high trajectory and mountain artillery and to inferior leadership, which, the writer says, is utterly without practical experience though equipped with all modern strategic and tactical theories.

The subsidiary causes, the correspondent says, are the lack of barbed wire for entanglements, necessitating the use of almost worthless trench branches; the adherence to old style Russian trenches with overhead coverings against shrapnel which, however, is disastrous when the arrival of the first shell, and in addition, the surprising lack of equipment for many of the troops as well as telephone material, wagons and aviators. The correspondent continues:

"The Rumanians have not even adopted the almost universal transportable kitchen wagons, but still carry food to the troops to the front in cans loaded on lumbering wagons."

"The Rumanians fight far better when defending their own territory than when on either the offensive or the defensive on Austro-Hungarian soil. They look for a short, decisive campaign and were unprepared for a long fight of the present character."

"Rumanian officers all carry and study religiously a general staff book on lessons learned from the war, but they seem to be unable to apply them practically. This partly, perhaps, is because the character of the warfare on the Rumanian border is unlike that on Russian and French fronts, but is rather back-and-forth mountain fighting between patrols and small troop sections with no solidified permanent front, so that flank and rear attacks are more frequent than frontal attacks, with friend and foe alike constantly attempting surprises. The difficulties also are enhanced by the similarity of the Rumanian and Austro-Hungarian uniforms."

SHORT COURSE STARTS DEC. 4

Is Fifth Annual Affair, Devoted to Industrial Education.

The fifth annual short course for farm boys and girls and dedicated to the purpose of industrial education, will commence December 4 and will continue until March 9, under the supervision of F. E. Lurton, superintendent of the East Grand Forks schools.

The short course is intended for farm boys and girls who have been unable to attend the regular school sessions during the winter months and all classes will be formed and conducted specially for them with the view to giving them work adapted to their particular needs. The work is intended for those who are too old or too advanced to longer attend the rural schools, and will be a splendid chance for them to get more schooling.

Students may enter at any time, but it is desirable that all should be present on the first day of the course, if possible. No tests or examinations are required for entrance—the only requirement being that the farm boy or girl be interested in farm work and farm life. Though no tuition fees will be required, students will buy their own books and supplies, which will be furnished them at a farm store.

Daily sessions will begin at 9 o'clock in the morning, and extend to the close of the school day. Students will have all the privileges extended the regular students. The whole equipment of the high school, assembly room, library, agricultural room, the museum, home economics rooms, manual training shop, blacksmithing shop, etc., will be at the service of the short course students.

All classes will be held in farm crops, animal husbandry, English, including spelling and letter writing, carpentry, blacksmithing, farm law, arithmetic, sewing and cooking.

GUNMEN RIFLE TILL AT F. DROSKY STORE

Make Getaway After Entering Building from Rear—Identity of Thieves Continues a Mystery.

It is believed the thieves boarded a railroad train and have gone east.
