

SIX CANDIDATES FILE ACCOUNTS

Wednesday Last Day For Office Seekers to Make Expenses Public.

Six more candidates for public office at the general election held November 7, have filed statements of their expense, incurred during the campaign.

J. F. T. O'Connor, candidate for the house of representatives from the Sixth legislative district, filed his report. Forty-two dollars and seventy-five cents as his covered campaign expenditures. Evinjorn Johnson, who made the race for the office of State's Attorney, spent \$161.50. Sheriff A. P. Turner, who had no opponent, had only the amount of \$50, donated to the county central committee fund, on his list.

M. W. Spaulding, clerk of court spent \$77, \$50 of which was donated to the county fund. Mr. Spaulding had no opponent. J. J. LaRime of Larimore, constable, and Justice of the Peace Phil McLoughlin had no campaign expense.

Wednesday will be the last day upon which candidates may have to file the account of their campaign expenses without penalty. It is expected that the remaining candidates will file tomorrow.

CLUB TO SEEK NEW MEMBERS

Membership Campaign Planned by Commercial Club for December 5 and 6—Hope to Gain 100 Members.

A membership campaign will be conducted by the Commercial club on December 5 and 6, and the club hopes to secure 100 new members by this means. Julius F. Bacon, chairman of the membership committee, will have charge of the campaign. The club committees will be divided into four groups of four men who will visit the prospective members, who have been sent a series of letters explaining the advantages of the club.

The club roster is in fairly good condition and for this reason an extensive campaign is not planned, but the committees will continue their activities throughout the year.

Sonny Matthew's Body Is Found, But Mystery of Disappearance Nine Months Ago, Still Unsolved

Chicago, Nov. 20.—"Sonny" Matthew's body was found in Lake Michigan, nine months after the disappearance of the boy, the 9 year old son of a wealthy director in the Armour Packing company.

The discovery ends a search in which his heartbroken parents combed a continent since Feb. 10. But the discovery does not clear the mystery surrounding the fate of the lad. For, while he disappeared nine months ago the authorities are confident that the body could not have been in the water that long.

As to his whereabouts between the time he disappeared and the time of his drowning, there is only conjecture—supposition based upon flimsy evidence of mysterious letters which indicated possible kidnapping and a desire for ransom.

Late today a former playmate of the lost boy was walking along the sand of Thirty-ninth street. A body came into view. The youngster took one look and began screaming.

"It's Sonny Matthews," he shouted. "I know him."

The body was removed to an undertaking establishment, where Louis E. Hamburg, uncle of the lost boy, made the identification.

STORM SWEEPS BRITISH COAST

Large Number of Vessels Driven Ashore at Various Points.

London, Nov. 20.—A renewal of the heavy gales which have visited the British coast recently caused a heavy loss to shipping Sunday. Four large outward bound steamers were compelled to return to Queenstown.

A large number of steamers and sailing vessels were driven ashore at different points. The British schooner Kenneth C. is ashore at Loughrea, County Louth, Ireland, a total wreck. Her crew was saved. The British steamer Muriston was driven ashore and broken in two south of Blyth. It is believed that the seventeen members of her crew perished. A Norwegian steamer is ashore in Blyth Bay. The crew was saved.

Hamburg, Barnett Matthews, the father, arrived at the morgue. He could not bring himself to view the body, but listened intently to the description given by Hamburg.

When Hamburg told of the little metallic buckles at the knees of the knickerbockers and the blucher shoes with a worn spot in the center of the sole, the father broke down.

The point of Thirty-ninth streets where the body was found is not far from the former residence of the Matthews family. At the time the boy disappeared, they lived at 664 East Thirty-ninth street.

"We could not bear to live there after 'Sonny' went away," said Mrs. Matthews.

The father sobbed as he told of "Sonny's" disappearance. "I gave him a penny, and he set off for the candy store," he said. "But before he got out of the house he railed the doughnut jar. And as he ran down the steps he held up his hand to me in a gesture of mock solemnity. Then he ran down the stairs and I watched him as he ran. It was the last time I saw him."

A week passed before the police search began. Then the family was harried by mysterious letters. All were followed as clues without result.

ENGLISH LOSE ON THE ANCRE

Germans Claim They Were Repulsed with Sanguinary Losses.

Berlin, Nov. 20.—(By wireless to Sayville).—British troops in their new offensive in the Ancre river region of France yesterday met with a sanguinary reverse, gaining at only a few places insignificant pieces of ground, according to the official German statement. The points where the Germans were pushed back, the statement adds, were to the southwest of Serre in Grandcourt and in the south of the latter town. French infantry attacks in St. Pierre Vaast wood broke down under heavy losses to the attackers. The text of the statement reads:

"Western war theater—Army group of Crown Prince Rupprecht: Artillery fire directed for some days against our positions on both sides of the river Ancre made a continuation of the English attack probable. Cavalry appearing yesterday behind the hostile front and the enormous increase of fire beginning early in the morning announced a new great attempt to break through our lines. The attempt ended in a sanguinary English reverse and gave them at only a few places an insignificant gain of ground.

"Southwest of Serre, in Grandcourt and at some places south of the villages we were pushed back and stand in prepared and positions on the south bank of the Ancre.

"All the other positions on the repeatedly attacked large front of twelve kilometers (7 1/2 miles) were maintained by our brave troops or were recaptured in a counter-attack. "A strong fire of the French artillery in the sector south of Saillly-Saillisset introduced attacks which broke down with heavy hostile losses on the northwest edge of St. Pierre Vaast wood."

AUTO HITS DOG, ONE MAN KILLED, ANOTHER INJURED

Congressional Recounts Start

Democrats Gain. Pittsburgh, Pa., Nov. 20.—The official recount of the vote resulted in M. Clyde Kelly, Democrat, cutting 374 votes from the lead of Representative W. H. Coleman, Republican, in the Thirtieth Pennsylvania congressional district and Guy E. Campbell, Democrat, increasing by 35 votes his lead over Representative A. J. Barchfeld, Republican in the Thirty-second district. With 79 out of 212 precincts remaining to be tabulated, the official count for Kelly was 12,521 and Coleman, 13,851, a plurality for the latter of 1,330. The vote for Campbell was 13,007 and Barchfeld, 12,835, a plurality of 172 for the former with 88 precincts out of 244 remaining to be counted.

Recount Held Up. Trenton, N. J., Nov. 20.—Justice Kalisch of the state supreme court allowed a writ of certiorari carrying to the supreme court for review his own action in granting a recount of the vote in the Third congressional district. The writ was obtained by Theodore Strong representing Robert Carson, Republican nominee for congress, who was elected over Representative Thomas J. Sully, Democrat, by eleven votes on the face of the canvass in the three counties comprising the district.

Mr. Strong contended that Justice Kalisch lacked authority in ordering the recount, that insufficient notice was given and that Sully's application did not contain sufficient data upon which to base the order for a recount.

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TEUTONS CONTEST FRENCH BITTERLY

Recapture of St. Pierre Vaast Wood Proves Strong Offensive.

Berlin, Nov. 20.—(By wireless to Sayville).—The German reconquest of the northern edge of St. Pierre Vaastwood," says the military critic of the Overseas News Agency, "proves that the offensive spirit of the German troops is alive notwithstanding that the battle has been raging for months. German troops dispute with the attacking enemy every inch of terrain gained by him.

"The attack on St. Pierre Vaastwood, November 15, was begun in the morning hours by an unnoticeable recapturing fire which was followed by several hours of demolishing fire. The few trees still erect were crushed and the soil again was turned upside down by the explosion of the heaviest calibre shells.

"After German aviators, during pauses in the bombardment, had ascertained the excellent effect of the artillery the attack was launched at 4:50 o'clock in the evening.

"In a few minutes the storming columns had reached the completely destroyed French trenches. After a stubborn resistance, the surviving French inmates surrendered. Eight officers and 324 men were brought in. The rest of the occupants were dead or wounded.

"The German curtain of fire made it impossible to bring on the French reserves. The effect of our artillery fire had been overwhelming. All the dugouts had been destroyed. Among the dead in the trenches could be seen eight officers, three of them captains. The dead included colored French troops from Algeria and even natives from Martinique, which proves that France now is compelled to raise recruits on the smallest and most remote islands in order to counter-balance the lack of soldiers which is becoming more evident every day."

TWO KILLED, MANY HURT

Explosion on Tugboat at Brooklyn Causes Two Deaths and Serious Injury to Others.

New York, Nov. 20.—Two men were killed and many seriously injured in an explosion today on a tugboat tied up at the Brooklyn waterfront.

GERMAN PRESS SCORES WILSON

Paper Terms the President "Pirate Business Manager" For England.

Berlin, Nov. 20.—The Rheinische Westfalische Zeitung, one of the most pronounced Chauvinist newspapers in Germany, ridicules President Wilson's reported peace proposals as a "general conference under the auspices of Great Britain and the United States for cheating Germany of all the fruits of this unheard of war."

The paper adds: "Even the most simple minded man cannot wish to

what we have to expect from a peace negotiated by England's pirate business manager beyond the ocean."

The Hamburger Nachrichten says: "President Wilson already has done so much for Great Britain that only one thing remains namely, to secure such a peace as England needs, robs Germany of all the fruits of her victories and leaves her impotent and placed under a guardianship."

The newspaper further insinuates that President Wilson was excited at the present moment by an increasing grain famine in England which must lead to her inevitable defeat if Germany draws the fight to a conclusion and remembers her own resources."

The article concludes: "Our destiny lies in our own hands. The most simple minded man cannot wish to

lay it in the hands of a man who while in Washington is attending to England's business."
