Supreme Court Decisions

From Burlington County. The C. L. Merrill company, a corporation, plaintiff and vs. Minneapolis, St. Paul & Sault Ste. Marie Railway company, a corporation, defendant and respondent.

1. Action to recover from a common carrier a sum alleged to have been unlawfully exacted by it from plaintiff in excess of the legal rate for freight. A daily newspaper printed, published and circulated in said County of Grand Forks, North Dakota; that the publication shall be at least twenty days prior to such hearing.

Held, that such prior decisions are as to defendant railway company's liability upon the issue there determined as to the confiscatory or non-confiscatory character of the rates as applied to the facts there considered, and such decision are in no way affected by the later decision of the supreme court of the United States above cited, which involved only issues arising out of new facts subsequently occurring. (See 236 U. S. 585, 59 L. Ed. 735.)

Appeal from the district court, Burlington county, N. Crawford, J. From a judgment in defendant's favor, plaintiff appeals.

Reversed and judgment directed for plaintiff.

Says Germany Will Be No Cripple in the Coming Trade War

Henry H. Morgan, United States consul general at Hamburg, Germany, declares that Germany will be ready for any trade war her enemies may wage against her after the end of hostilities in the field.

"The empire expects to do a big business with America," says Morgan, "despite feelings which may have been engendered by the war. German bankers will be in a position after the war to assist trade development in the fullest measure, for Germany has sent but little money out of the country for war expenses as compared to what the allies have sent to America."

After receiving the brotherhood heads and Chairman Adamson, author of the eight hour law, President Wilson virtually finished the conference in congress in which he will recommend completion of railway legislative program outlined by him at the last session. The record of the conference provisions for the enlargement of the Interstate Commerce Commission and for compulsory investigation of proposed railway rates.

President Wilson's members of a committee of the Evansville, Ind., Chamber of Commerce, who called during the day to tell him that there would be a meeting of the Interstate Commerce Commission on the railroad situation in their city early in December, that he hoped there would be similar discussions of the problem in other sections of the United States and that he wished all business men would investigate the question in an open minded way.

Representative Adamson went over plans for railroad legislation in full with the president. Mr. Adamson said he had no doubt that the eight hour law would be upheld by the courts as constitutional, adding that the measure would be carefully framed by lawyers, fully familiar with the situation and with the constitution.

"I have a bill prepared for additional legislation to meet the situation when congress convenes," he said. He added that he believed the Interstate Commerce Commission under existing laws already had the power to take wages into consideration in fixing freight rates. President Wilson embodied a recommendation for legislation giving this power when addressing congress on the threatened strike, but the Georgia representative said he believed the president would agree with him in the end.

Mr. Adamson also declared it was his personal opinion that the suits to test the constitutionality of the eight hour law were brought in a further effort to secure advances in freight rates and that if any definite assurance of increased rates were given the cases would not be pressed.

The brotherhood still quite as uncommunicative and mysterious as they were at the time of the conference which resulted in enactment of the Adamson law, appeared well pleased with the situation tonight. They were particularly elated over their talk with the president and the presence of addressing members of the federation in Baltimore tomorrow.

GETS KNOCKERS OF THE CANAL

Gen. Goethals Makes Sharp Reply to Critics of the Great Waterway.

Washington, Nov. 21.-Sharp language is employed by Major General George W. Goethals, governor of the Panama canal zone, in replying to published criticisms of the big waterway which he charges have seriously affected its commercial rating. In his annual report, made public by the war department, the governor declares that the earth movements which have frequently interrupted traffic through the canal finally will be overcome for all time.

Gen. Goethals goes into a lengthy review of the geological problems which have been encountered, of the steps taken to overcome such obstacles and the measure of success attained. So far as the Culebra cut is concerned, he said, the worst is over. The intervals between movements are becoming greater and the quantities of material less.

The report replies to the published statements of Governor Benjamin L. Roy Miller of Leigh university, and former Senator Thomas Kearns of Utah. The charges made in each case, General Goethals brands as "erroneous, unwarranted and unfair." It is shown in the report that during a part of the fiscal year 1916 during which the canal was opened, 411 vessels passed from the Atlantic to the Pacific and 378 in the other direction. Of all these, only 91 were engaged in the American coast-wise trade, due principally to the scarcity of ships for foreign trade which drew American coasting vessels into that service.

Difficulties of the present system of levying tolls are rectified and General Goethals again recommends that legislation be sought making the earning capacity of a ship the basis upon which the charges should be computed. He points out that \$2,399,850 were collected in tolls during 1916. Had the so-called Panama canal rules applied in measuring the ships, he adds, this sum would have been increased by approximately \$400,000.

New York Faces Big Canned Goods Famine

New York, Nov. 21.-Retail grocers complain of a shortage of canned goods and some predict that only one-third of the normal supply will be available in New York this winter. Many grocers are running out of their supplies of standard, widely advertised canned products.

One reason advanced for the shortage is that many of the big canning factories have contracted to send their entire output to the warring nations in Europe.

BROTHERHOOD CHIEFS WILL BE IN COURT

Determined to Use Every Means to Have Rule Held Binding.

Washington, Nov. 21.-Heads of the railroad brotherhoods, determined that the Adamson eight hour law shall not be broken down, conferred here today with President Wilson, Attorney General Gregory and their legislative representatives, declared their purpose to aid the government in every way in fighting injunction suits against the law, and made further plans for perfecting a working agreement with their allies in the railroad men of the American Federation of Labor.

When the government attorneys, G. Carroll Todd, assistant to the attorney general, assistant Attorney General Underwood and Frank Hagerman appear in the federal court at Kansas City next Thursday to oppose the Union Pacific representatives, the latter will be flanked by Messrs. Todd and Underwood left to right for Kansas City.

Great significance is attached to the announcement today that the brotherhood heads will address the American Federation of Labor convention in Baltimore. Never before in the history of the two organizations have any of their members met in joint session, but their meeting at Baltimore will be the result of a carefully worked out agreement that the two forces shall join hands in working for the betterment of the organized railway employees.

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
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
