SCHOOL FACULTY ATTEND MEETING

Local Schools Well Represented at Crookston Gathering.

Superintendent Lurton of the East Grand Forks city schools left this afternoon for Crookston, where he will attend the Northwestern Teachers' association, which convenes there this evening and will continue Thursday and Friday.

The city school will close Thursday and Friday, in order to give members of the local faculty an opportunity to attend the meeting. They will leave for Crookston tomorrow. It is expected that about 600 teachers of the northern district will attend.

Several members of the local faculty will have important places on the program. Thursday afternoon, T. C. Lloyd-Jones will speak before the manual training department, and Miss Julia Zanger will speak before the home economics department. Superintendent Lurton will speak before the library, superintendents, and home economic sections. He also will preside over the high school section the following day.

At a meeting of the agricultural men Thursday, Professor H. M. Swift of the local school agricultural department will present and perfecting rules and regulations for conducting the live stock contest which will be held in connection with the Crookston Crop Show in February.

No date has yet been set for a hearing, but it is thought it will come up within a week.
