

### SUPERVISORS MEET TODAY

#### Noxious Weed Problem to be Brought up—To Elect Officers.

Members of the Grand Forks county board of township supervisors met this afternoon in the farmers' room at the court house for their annual session, called by President O. K. Lagerson of Bentrup and Secretary John Freeman of Grand Forks. The supervisors gathered this morning and remained in session for a short period to prepare for the meeting this afternoon. About 20 were in attendance. Noxious weeds, methods of eradication, and the enforcement of the state law relative to destructive grasses, were taken up this afternoon. Several other important subjects also will be brought up, and at the close of the session, officers for the ensuing year will be elected. The weed problem will be the most important to be taken up, however, as the losses suffered as the result of mustard and wild grasses during the past season were heavy. The little fight that was made to eradicate them was insufficient to prevent the seed from being scattered broadcast, indicating an unusual heavy damage next year, providing an effort is not made to prevent it.

### MRS. FELSING BURIED TODAY

#### Former Prominent Crookston Woman Laid to Rest in Memorial Park.

Funeral services were held this afternoon over the remains of Mrs. S. D. Felsing, who succumbed Tuesday morning from peritonitis. The service was held from the family residence at 521 University avenue with Rev. H. H. Hodgson of Minneapolis officiating. Interment was made in Memorial Park cemetery. Deceased was 47 years of age and was formerly a resident of Crookston, leaving that city about four years ago for Galesburg, N. D. Recently the Felsing family removed to Grand Forks in order that the children might be given a better opportunity to obtain an education. Mrs. Felsing became suddenly ill last week and was taken to a local hospital but she failed to rally. Besides her husband she is survived by four children. Mr. Felsing was formerly connected with the Maple Bay Wind Stacker company of Crookston. The pall bearers were prominent business men of Crookston. ### COLD WAVE EXPECTED TO HIT GRAND FORKS SOME TIME TONIGHT

Boy, pay the coal man! The first cold wave prediction of the year was given out this afternoon by the weather bureau at Washington, through the local station at the state university. Yesterday the forecast was for much colder tonight. The lowest the mercury has fallen up to this time during the present season is 5 degrees below zero.

### 45 TEAMSTERS WENT ON STRIKE

#### Claimed They Were Unable to Stand Decrease in Wages.

Claiming a cut in wages made it impossible for them to meet living expenses, 45 teamsters employed by Jackson & Williams, sub-contractors for the Wallace Construction company of Crookston, in charge of graveling the county road about eight miles north of East Grand Forks, went on a strike yesterday afternoon. The men claimed they had been getting \$4 for a days' work for themselves and teams, and that they had received notice that hereafter they would receive \$2.50 for the same amount of work, an amount insufficient to meet the cost of living for themselves and families, and of providing their teams, they maintain. Hauling had been done from the N. P. tracks in East Grand Forks. In a statement today, Wilbur Williams said that the men had told only one side of the story. "We only expected the men to do a fair days' work," said Mr. Williams. "We made no unjust demands upon them, but expected them to meet us half way. Instead of a decrease in wages, we offered them an increase to \$5 per day, asking only that they haul two loads of gravel on the basis of \$2.50 per load. There has been no trouble but for a couple of disturbing elements among the men. Today, about 20 resumed work, and tomorrow we again will be running a full crew. The strike has had little effect on the work, and we expect to have our contract finished in about a week."

### WARRANTS ARE ISSUED TODAY

#### Election Officials Compensated by County—May ask Reimbursements of City.

Warrants were forwarded today to the various judges and clerks of election by County Auditor Hans Anderson. Each judge and clerk received 25 cents an hour for his services with four dollars as the maximum amount. Many judges and clerks in the city polls worked the greater portion of the night, compiling the election returns, but received only the four dollars for their labors. County officials declare that the election officers employed at the polls where the city bond issue was included among the issues, are entitled to the double pay, which has been refused by the city authorities. Judges and clerks who performed the duties for the city without compensation, declare that they were put to considerable trouble in compiling the bond issue returns, and separate records were kept and the work of compilation was independent of the general issues.

### RELIEF WORK WILL BE STARTED SOON

#### Salvation Army Will Begin Investigation to Find Families Worthy of Assistance.

The local Salvation Army officers in a few days will begin the campaign for the Christmas relief work. An investigation will be made as to the worthy poor, and after all the families have been visited, the list will be compared with that of the Associated Charities, so there will be no duplications. The needs of every family will be considered and baskets will be made up accordingly. They will contain everything suitable for a good Christmas dinner. At the time the family is visited a ticket will be left and some member of the family can come to the Salvation Army hall the day before Christmas and claim their basket. In cases where they are old people or very young children, volunteer helpers will take the baskets to the homes. Last year the local army spent nearly \$200 in caring for people and about 50 families were provided with Christmas dinners. In a week or so, the officers in charge here will issue a general call for assistance in providing for the people, as it will be more of a task this year than before, because of the high prices of all commodities.
