## AGRICULTURAL MEETING FOR WILLIAMS CO.

Program for Fourth Convention is Best Ever Arranged.

Williston, N. D., Nov. 23.—The fourth annual Williams county agricultural convention will be held in the Williston armory December 12, 13, 14, 15. The program provides for a large number of interesting events and the speakers this year will be men who are thoroughly versed in agriculture.

On Tuesday, December 12, and Wednesday, December 13, at 1:30 each afternoon special meetings will be held for women. Practical problems in farm housekeeping will be discussed. These meetings will be led by Ida Ratzlaff who was raised on a North Dakota farm and has made a study of the farm household in this section of the country. Speakers for the convention are: M. B. Johnson, County Agricultural Agent for McKenzie county; J. E. Eastgate, farmer from Larimore; Alfred Wenz, Associate Editor of the Dakota Farmer and a farmer himself; James E. Boyle, field agent in markets for the North Dakota Experiment Station; John R. Humphrey of the market and rural organization, Washington, D. C., and a specialist in farmers elevators. Superintendent C. H. Ruszicka, in charge of the Experiment Station at Williston. The program follows:

## SECTION HAND SHOT FOUR TIMES; MAY DIE

New Rockford, N. D., Nov. 23.—In a gun fight between two Italian members of a section crew working in this vicinity, four bullets, fired by Frank Caruse, from a revolver, lodged in the back of Mike Vahre, and it is doubtful whether the man will live. The fight started when Caruse missed ten dollars from his pocket and accused Vahre of taking it. Words were exchanged, but the men went to their work. Vahre was pushing a handcar when, without warning, it is alleged Caruse pulled a .38 caliber revolver from his pocket and opened fire on him. The victim fell to the ground and Caruse struck out across a field. The assailant, a youth of 20 years, was captured after a long chase and taken to the county jail, where he is held pending the outcome of Vahre's injuries. Caruse asserted, it is said, that after a heated word battle, Vahre threatened to kill him and he decided to "get" him first.

## LARIMORE CHURCH HOLDS ANNUAL MEET

Larimore, N. D., Nov. 23.—The congregation of the Larimore Presbyterian church held its annual meeting on Wednesday night. Encouraging reports were presented from the church members. The pastor, Rev. F. W. Pugh, O. A. Hazen, treasurer of the board of trustees, Superintendent T. J. Radcliffe, Treasurer A. J. Jordan, and Mrs. A. J. Jordan, chairman of the Ladies' Aid, and Miss Emma C. Arnold for the Women's Missionary society. Two new members had joined the church during the year and two names had been restored, making an increase of 20 in the church roll. The pastor reported a healthy growth and a financial balance. B. J. Radcliffe and A. P. Jordan were re-elected elders, and A. J. Jordan and G. M. Naylor trustees to succeed themselves.

## Sliding Scale For Electricity at Beach

Beach, N. D., Nov. 23.—Under a franchise granting W. V. Hughes the right to establish an electric light plant at Beach, under consideration by the city council, a sliding scale of rates, with 15 cents per kilowatt hour, as the maximum charge, will be used. The ordinance has passed its first reading.

## R. M. Farmers Gets \$3,000 Verdict; His Second Victory

Bismarck, N. D., Nov. 23.—F. M. Farmer of Fargo yesterday won a \$3,000 verdict in the supreme court and in so doing, obtained his second favorable court consideration within two weeks—for it was just two weeks ago that he was acquitted in the federal court at Fargo of using the mails to defraud. In the supreme court decision, Farmer wins a verdict for commission on the sale of land, notwithstanding the fact that the sale of land was made by the actual owner, at a less figure than listed with Mr. Farmer, as agent. The court held that Farmer procured the customer.

## GOV. HANNA HAS ONE LOVELY JOB

Naming Commissioners of New Grant County is a Trying Task.

Bismarck, N. D., Nov. 23.—From a list of 50 applicants, Governor Hanna at 2 o'clock this afternoon began the task of selecting three commissioners for the new county of Grant. The duty is an important one. Grant county is a large, populous, progressive community. Much depends upon the personnel of the new commission, which will select the temporary county seat and name every county officer. The choice of commissioners is unusually complicated by the active campaign which has been waged by fully a dozen towns which hope to be the first county seat of Grant, including New Leipzig, Elgin, Carson and others. The Northern Pacific, Raleigh, Brinkman and Leith on the Milwaukee railway, and Shields and Pretty Rock, inland towns. Delegations from the towns have been in Bismarck almost every day since the recent election created Grant county, and all are represented at the hearing this afternoon.

When the three commissioners are named they will be required to meet at once and organize the county board. This board will select a county auditor, register of deeds, county judge, clerk of court, state's attorney and other officers; arrange for the transcription of records from Morton county, and make provision for the collection of taxes due Grant county. The last item is an important one, as Bismarck almost every day since the present time. It will have, however, a large sum in taxes due December 1, which will be levied on Grant as a portion of Morton county, but which will be paid to the new county. There has been some uncertainty as to Grant county's representation in the fifth legislative assembly, and a question as to whether the new commissioners would be called upon to name a senator and member of the house. Governor Hanna advises that Grant county will be considered for legislative purposes a part of the district formerly comprised by Morton county, and that it will be represented in the next assembly by the senator recently elected from Morton county. The commissioners have no authority to name any state officers.

## Y. M. C. A. Older Boys' Conference Begins Friday at Jamestown

Jamestown, N. D., Nov. 23.—Tomorrow marks the opening of the Y. M. C. A. older boys' conference to be held in this city. This is the third annual meeting of this kind to be held in the city. Rev. Bruce E. Jackson, general secretary of the Y. M. C. A., will be in charge. It is expected that 50 boys will participate and officials of organizations over the state will take part in the program. Delegates and adult leaders from Bismarck, Grand Forks, Valley City, LaMoure and several other cities are expected. Rev. Bruce E. Jackson of Bismarck is scheduled to give an important address on "High School and Other Clubs."

The conference will close with a session for delegates only on Sunday afternoon, November 26.

## N. D. GUARDS TO BE FED WELL ON THANKSGIVING DAY

Bismarck, N. D., Nov. 23.—Every North Dakota company of militia at the Mexican border will be given a real Thanksgiving day feast as a result of work conducted in each city by the women. This week's big boxes containing all kinds of seasonal delicacies, are being forwarded to Mercedes, Tex., where the North Dakota guardmen are located, and a special Thanksgiving day should be some event for the troopers.

Fargo, N. D., Nov. 23.—Scottish Rite Masons conclude their annual fall reunion here this evening with a banquet at the closing feature. Tomorrow, El Zagal temple takes the stage and the big ceremonial session of the Shriner will attract a big number of visitors from over the northwest.

## GRAFTON MAN BADLY INJURED

Grafton, N. D., Nov. 23.—When the horse, driven by Frank McAuley, who was accompanied by his wife, became frightened by an automobile and ran away, McAuley was thrown from the buggy and badly injured, his head striking the ground with terrific force. Two machines passed at the same time on opposite sides of the horse and the animal made a dash. The buggy was overturned and the occupants thrown. Mrs. McAuley was hurt, but her injuries were confined to minor bruises and scratches.


