COLES BOUND OVER TO COURT

Local Man Will Appear Before Grand Jury on Charge of Blindpigging.

Charles Coles, of this city, arrested several weeks ago on the charge of blindpigging, was bound over to the next term of the grand jury, when given a hearing before Judge Gosman at Crookston late yesterday afternoon. His bail has been fixed at \$200, which he has been unable to furnish.

Several state witnesses were introduced. Matt Schroeder, of this city, who alleges he made a purchase of three bottles of whiskey from the defendant, is the principal witness for the prosecution.

Mrs. Theodore Mayer of this city testified for the defense. She declared that she was mending clothes for Coles at the time he is alleged to have sold the liquor. Mrs. Thomas Harig, also of this city, proprietor of a rooming house in which Coles lived, also testified that Coles seldom rose until late in the afternoon. He is accused of having disposed of the whiskey in the forenoon.

The grand jury has been called for January 8.

Crookston, Minn., Nov. 24.—At the meeting of the Northwestern Teachers' association, which is being held here today, Supt. C. G. Selvig of the Crookston School of Agriculture, was named president; A. J. Jedlicka, city superintendent of schools of Mahanomen, vice president; Miss Synneva Grindeland, secretary and treasurer; C. R. MacDonell, principal of the East Grand Forks schools, and L. G. Maustain, superintendent of the Fosston schools, as members of the executive committee.

The greater portion of the time this morning was spent in electing officers and a general discussion of the work of the association. The feature event of the day will be the Schoolmaster's banquet to be held this evening, at which J. Frank Hanly, who headed the prohibition ticket at the general election, will be the guest of honor and the principal speaker.

Nearly 600 teachers are in attendance at the sessions and the event is declared to be the most successful ever held by the northwestern pedagogues.

18,000 Employees to Get Wage Increase

Manchester, N. California Launch World Peace Move

San Francisco, Nov. 24.—A movement for world peace is under way here, with prominent men of the state as sponsors and the support of the American neutral conference committee with headquarters in New York to make it nationwide in its scope. The campaign seeks to obtain in California the signatures of from 500,000 to 800,000 persons asking the United States to move "alone or in co-operation with other neutral nations" to bring about peace and a guarantee against future wars.
