Odell's Children's Home Day an Occasion To Help the Work For Little Ones; Grand Forks Schools do Not Aid

At this season of the year it well becomes us to give a thought to the unfortunate about us. Happily North Dakota, and particularly Grand Forks and vicinity, are prosperous and there is very little of what the great populous and industrial centers know as poverty.

Nevertheless, there are unfortunate who by the sad fact of their existence have a claim on our sympathies. For instance, the homeless child. Can you imagine anything more pathetic in all experience than a homeless babe or child at helpless, tender years?

It is a fact—and it is to the disgrace of North Dakota—that the state has placed a number of small children in the reform school at Fargo because there was no other place available for them.

The society is chartered by the state, endorsed by the governor and supreme bench, and licensed by the juvenile court. It has a well-equipped receiving home in Fargo at 304 Tenth street south, with a capacity of fifty-five children.

During the fifteen years in which Mr. Hall has been superintendent of the home, he has received a great many children from Grand Forks, both from private sources, from the county commissioners and from the juvenile court.
