## NORMAL MAY BE READY IN 1918

Appropriation Probably will be Made in Early Part of Legislature Session

Bismarck, N. D., Nov. 27.—The latest vote on the Dickinson normal stands 49,410 for and 40,009 against. There remain to be heard from eleven counties. The vote to date is keeping pace with that on the presidency, showing an unusual degree of interest throughout the state. It is anticipated that a suitable appropriation for the normal school will be made early during the coming legislative session, and that the buildings can be completed and all arrangements made for the reception of students for the early fall semester in 1918. The total vote as returned by the official county canvassing boards to the office of secretary of state is 89,419, and the normal's majority is more than 9,000. It is anticipated that returns from the eleven counties yet to be heard from will give the normal an easy majority of all the votes cast, as well as a big majority of the votes on this particular proposition.

## Flicker Tales

Fargo—In a raid on a local house, Jess Holt and Cassius Holley were arrested on a charge of gambling, on warrants issued by County Judge Hanson.

Fargo—A pet monkey was recently added to the collection of living animals at the zoo of the agricultural college.

Bismarck—B. W. Shaw of Mandan was at the capital yesterday, coming over to escort personally the certified returns of the Morton county canvassing board.

Bismarck—Carson, the new county seat of Grant, is to have a new bank. The Carson State bank was chartered by the secretary of state Saturday morning. The incorporators are L. A. Tavis, Joseph P. Hess and George W. Janda, and the capital is \$15,000.

Minot—Sheriff Nedrelos seized a carload of whiskey at Logan. Officials claim it was consigned to fictitious parties. Eighteen barrels of 120 pints each are being held.

Killdeer—When a car being driven by Edna Smith, accompanied by Marion Smith, turned turtle, both young women were badly injured.

Mandan—Sixty-four carloads of grain were shipped from this city during October.

Bismarck—The Lillibridge Land and Stock company of Dickinson, has incorporated with a capital stock of \$25,000. E. A. Lillibridge and Lillian Lillibridge are incorporators.

New England—G. More, 69, charges three local men with choking and robbing him.

Fargo—A rifle club has been formed by 14 members of the Agricultural college cadets, the club to be under the direction of the national rifle club. Officers are: McQuigan, president; Elliott, secretary, and Kelley, treasurer.

Fargo—About the same number of acres in this state are being made ready for grain next year, despite the high prices which would seem to increase the interest in grain raising.

## \$10,000 MORE CUT FROM STATE'S DEBT

Bismarck, N. D., Nov. 27.—An additional ten thousand was trimmed from North Dakota's bonded indebtedness at a joint meeting of the state auditing board and the state board of university and school lands. On motion of State Treasurer John Steen, \$10,000, being the complete balance outstanding of the state hospital for the insane bonds was retired from the interest and sinking fund. The complete bonded indebtedness of North Dakota is now \$462,000, or approximately sixty cents per capita. Four years ago the state's bonded debt was \$97,300. Practically all these bond payments have been anticipated, and the money paid into the university and school funds as a result has immediately been reinvested in farm mortgages and public school bonds. New York public school pupils are forming walking clubs.

## NATIONAL CONFERENCE WAS PROFITABLE ONE

North Dakota Representatives of Railroad Commission Pleased With Results, Says Cushing.

Bismarck, N. D., Nov. 27.—Secretary Walter F. Cushing and Rate Expert J. A. Little, who accompanied Chairman W. H. Stuttmann to Washington for the national conference of state railroad commissions, are back at their desks today. They report the sessions as most profitable in the light which they shed on the railroad situation in general. Several conferences were held with Senator Newland's investigating committee. While the national conference has adjourned and a majority of the state commissioners have returned home, there has been left in Washington to represent the state a committee composed of ex-Senator Bristow of Kansas, chairman; C. M. Candler, L. B. Finn, chairman of the Kentucky railroad commission; C. D. Jackson of Wisconsin, E. C. Niles of New Hampshire, Judge O. A. Thompson of Illinois and Max Thelan of California, president of the National Association of Railroad Commissioners.

## NEW \$5,000 FERRY TO CROSS MISSOURI

Bismarck, N. D., Nov. 27.—L. A. Tavis of Mandan, a member of the Red Trail Ferry company recently organized to establish service between Mandan and the capital city, announced at the capital this morning that Charles Wilcox, an experienced ferryman, has been awarded the contract to build a boat to cost between \$5,000 and \$5,000, and which is to be placed in commission as soon as the ice goes out in the spring. The boat will be built at Washburn, where material will be delivered about January 1. It will be 64 feet long, with a 27-foot beam, and will be propelled by a 30 horsepower engine. It will accommodate eight cars and will carry a crew of three. Permanent approaches and shelter houses will be built on both sides of the river. The grade for the new Red Trail highway leading from Mandan to the Missouri has been graded half way to the river and will be completed early in the spring.

## Three Men Are Fined For Not Sending Children to School

Mandan, N. D., Nov. 27.—Three men, W. C. Thomason, Carl Rhiel and Christian Meier, were arrested and arraigned before Judge H. L. Hanks for not sending their children to school. Each was fined \$15 and costs and put up a bond assuring the officials that they would send the children to school.

## SECOND ANNUAL SHORT COURSE

## SUICIDE IDENTIFIED BY LAUNDRY MARK

Fargo, N. D., Nov. 27.—A transient who killed himself here on one of the resident streets Sunday by sending a bullet through his head, tried to preclude identification by removing trade marks on his clothing and laundry marks on his shirt. He failed to find one laundry mark, however, and through this officials identified him as J. E. Galp. They have no clue, however, as to his residence.

## TWO PRISONERS PLEAD GUILTY

Stanley, N. D., Nov. 27.—John Riley, arrested here last fall for being implicated in the robbery of L. M. Olson, which ended in the murder of Olson; and Stewart Nott of Blaisdell, who was charged with disposing of intoxicating liquors, were taken to Williston where they pleaded guilty. Riley was sentenced to 10 years in the state prison and Nott was given 90 days in the county jail and must pay a fine of \$300.


