TANK SWEEPS OVER TRENCH INTO GERMANS

Yorkshire Soldier Describes Terror Caused by the Monsters.

A story of how the famous British "tanks" got into action was issued recently by the Official Press Bureau in London. The story was written by a Yorkshire enlisted man and is as follows:

"During my first day with the 'tank' we were working with a Yorkshire battalion. For that reason our ship had its name changed from 'Biting Billy' to 'The Tyke'. It was a strange experience at first, but we got used to it, and soon found it the most exciting kind of joy-riding imaginable.

"Our first experience of putting the fear of God into the heart of Fritz was the day they tried to cut off the West Yorkshire. They delivered one of their steam-hammer surprise attacks just after the West Yorkshire had settled into a new trench that had been captured after very hard fighting. They had tried to smother the defenders under heavy gunfire before making the attack, and the Yorkshire lads were greatly outnumbered all the time.

"We cut in at the gray dawn of a misty morning, and as we appeared suddenly into the mist behind our own trenches we must have given the Yorkshire chaps a big surprise as we were to give the enemy later. We were right in the middle of the trench, and the enemy was not far off. It was so misty that we could see nothing at first, but gradually, as it cleared, we could discern the movements of the enemy all around. The tank's least idea of anything happening, and were moving about to further their plans for rushing the trench held by the enemy.

"Unseen ourselves, we were able to watch all this coming and going with interest. We didn't make any move until the enemy had comfortably settled down. Then we got up steam, so to speak, and careened right in among the whole outfit. If we had been in the line, as we were, we couldn't have caused greater astonishment than we did when we poked our ugly nose in among that select little party of German soldiers who were the most astonishing kind was painted on the face of every manjack of the 'Fritzes'. A few were so terrified that they stood rooted to the ground as though turned to stone, but the rest bolted as though a carload of devils were after them.

"We didn't want to collect the petrol fumes, but we had to get on with the runaways. We got at them with our guns and brought them down before they had run far. Then we returned to wait the attack, which was delivered in ignorance of the fact that had overtaken the machine gun party. We kept under cover until the attacking column was well up toward its objective. Then we gave the enemy a hot time, and put ourselves across the line of the advancing enemy. They were frightened out of their wits, I think. The leading troops turned tail and fled, discarding their arms in their flight. We went full blast at them and our guns played great havoc with them all the time. In about twenty minutes their whole party of attack was knocked on the head and they were in full retreat. The West Yorkshire lads were relieved, and they gave us a good reception when we got back.

BIG INVASION OF EGYPT BY THE OTTOMEN

Operations on Large Scale in Preparation Enver Pasha Says.

Berlin, Dec. 9. (via Sayville)—The Turkish offensive against the Suez Canal has not been given up, and the Egyptian campaign will be resumed at the right moment. This was the statement made by Enver Pasha in a recent speech before parliament, giving a summary of the general situation.

"The Turkish Army," he said, "after having operated the English in Iraq, colluded with the Russians and has advanced in the north and west as well as on the Felahie front, against the English and Russians, and has barred the gateways of Iraq. Now the Persian warriors have been organized into a regular fighting force equipped by us, and are fighting on our side against the enemy."

"The retreat in the Caucasus, due to lack of communications, was ordered for a military reason; nevertheless our Southern Army has reconquered Bitlis and is preparing for offensive operations. The lost territory is insignificant in comparison with territory taken from the Rumanians, which will be held as a trump in the peace negotiations. But I state my conviction that the Ottoman Army will fulfill its task and drive the enemy out of our country."

"We have sent numerous troops to Gallicia, Dobruza, Serbia and Drama to aid our allies and conquer the common foe. Our troops in Dobruza have contributed measurably to defeat the Russians and Rumanians, and the necessary troops will be withdrawn in order to prepare large scale operations. The goal pursued in Egypt has by no means been given up, and the necessary forces will at the right moment be employed for the Egyptian campaign."

"Nobody ever wants to bring up more than one family of quarrelsome children. The sending of such large forces out of our country by no means endangers the safety of the nation, for Turkey possesses sufficient military forces to defend her territory and at the same time send large reserves elsewhere."

"Regarding the Egyptian expedition, during the operations east of Egypt, Turkish troops advanced to reconquer the enemy forces and then withdrew in order to prepare large scale operations. The goal pursued in Egypt has by no means been given up, and the necessary forces will at the right moment be employed for the Egyptian campaign."
