VITAL GAMES FOR THE TITLE ON SATURDAY

Minnesota Expects an Easy Victory Over Indiana at Home.

Illinois-Wisconsin Struggle Will be One of the Hottest Kind.

Chicago, Oct. 18.—Games of importance in the scramble for the "Big Ten" football championship are set for decision Saturday. The Minnesota eleven will attempt to eliminate Indiana from the race in a game to be played at Minneapolis. Wisconsin and Illinois will clash at Urbana, and Chicago will take on Purdue at Stagg field.

Although other western conference teams will take the field, their results will have no bearing on the championship. Iowa will face Grinnell at Iowa City and Michigan will play the Michigan Aggies at Ann Arbor. Ohio State, which many cities regard as likely to retain the conference title which it won for the first time last year, and Northwestern have no contests scheduled.

Zupke Expects Hard Fight.

Pointing to its overwhelming victories over Kansas and Oklahoma, Illinois hopes to make its conference debut of the season with a triumph over Wisconsin. Coach Zupke started in Monday to develop an attack and warned his players to expect a desperate battle from the Badgers, who held the strong Notre Dame eleven to a scoreless draw last week. The game also will be Wisconsin's first conference affair of the season.

OPEN TACTICS MORE GENERAL THIS SEASON

Coaches Rounding up Teams For Crucial Games of the Year.

Zupke Builds His Machine on Individual Work More than Ever.

Gophers Look for Easy Victory.

Minnesota is expected to take Indiana's measure, although the Hoosiers are determined to hold the Gophers to the closest possible score. Coach Stichtel of the Indiana institution has been seriously handicapped through the lack of material, but has succeeded in developing a "scrap" eleven of which two or three veterans formed the nucleus. Minnesota demonstrated its driving power in rolling up a 64 to 0 score against South Dakota state last Saturday. With but one exception the players emerged from the contest without injury. Sullivan, a promising halfback, suffered a bruised back, and probably will be kept out of practice until next week. It was his first contest with Minnesota and his thirty end runs caused much comment.

Play a Varied Game.

In the west, Ohio state showed the most versatile mid-season attack of any of the big ten teams in its game against Northwestern at Columbus. The Buckeyes made ground against the purple by use of both the simplest and the most complicated plays. When they needed a gain of one or two yards, they took advantage of the open game, and when closely pressed for a short yard on the fourth down, they used straight plays.

Northwestern Still Scrappy.

The Northwestern eleven, which will be idle Saturday, is facing a brisk training program in preparation for the annual clash with Chicago October 27. Coach Fred Murphy and followers of the purple squad decline to admit that Northwestern, despite its overwhelming defeat at the hands of Ohio State, is entirely out of the running for conference honors.

The coach has evolved plays in which he thinks he can get the best results from the man carrying the ball. He realizes that opportunities will arise when one man may be able to gain ground on certain formations where another cannot. For this reason Zupke has built plays around every man eligible to carry the ball.

Both Coach Williams of Minnesota and Stichtel of Indiana have worked up versatile attacks with the open game the predominant weapon of offense. Other teams are using the same tactics and it is safe to say that fans in the west will see more of the open game than any time since 1906, the first year of the forward pass and ten yard rule.

A CIVIL WAR ANALOGY

It is idle to say that only the Teutonic allies are tired of the war. Every one of the powers, except Japan and the United States, is more or less affected with the same weariness. But the allies are upheld by the certainty of victory, and the moment is talk among all the belligerents of coming peace, that does not mean that the war will be over this year. The situation is analogous to the closing years of the Civil War when peace was a favorite theme. The boycott of the south, its economic isolation, spelled defeat for the south long before its armies ceased fighting. This blockade of Germany and her allies, now to be more rigidly enforced than ever before, is only a question of time when the economic strain on powers about to share Germany, Austria and Turkey from the rest of the world, cannot be endured indefinitely. Irrespective of the fortunes of the battlefield it is only a question of time when the blockade and the economic strain will snap the weakest link in the Teutonic chain.—Charles Bates Stewart, in Leslie's.

ON TO BERLIN, IS PURPOSE OF NEW WAR TRUCK

U. S. Making Ready for "The Day" When Great Push Starts.

Washington, D. C., Oct. 18.—The big vital reason for the construction of the standard war trucks, which have just made such a remarkable record in their first public tests, is that the American army expects to drive "On to Berlin" over the shell-torn, dynamited roads back of the present German lines—and no commercial truck can be depended on to do the job.

That is why American army officers are jubilant. They are keen for its standardization. It will save the storage of millions of repair parts. SPEAKING OF SHELLS, READ THIS, BILL!

Washington, Oct. 18.—If any one in Germany really believes your Uncle Sam is not going at this war in grim earnest, there are some figures that ought to undeceive him:

By Sept. 30 next there will have been prepared for the army alone something like 50,000,000 shells, costing close to \$1,000,000,000.

This will require close to 2,000,000 tons of bars and steel forgings.

Thirty-three million 75-millimeter shells for field and anti-aircraft guns will require about 685,000 tons of steel.

Approximately 17,000,000 larger-sized shells, varying from 6 to 12 inches in diameter, will require over 1,000,000 tons of steel.

And all this vast amount of metal is to be hurled against the German lines on the western front, in addition to what the English and French have in pickle for the kaiser's men.
