

ANOTHER CHANGE OF VENUE WILL BE ASKED TODAY

Defendants in Centralia Shooting Case Will Make Such Application.

Montesano, Wash., Jan. 26.—With the case of eleven alleged Industrial Workers of the World charged with the murder of four former soldiers in Centralia, Wash., last November during an armistice day parade, set for trial here today, an announcement was made yesterday that a third application for a change of venue would be made in behalf of the defendants.

Attorneys that sentiment in Gray's Harbor county against the defendants would deprive them of a fair trial were served upon W. H. Abel of course for the prosecution.

Ten of the defendants are specifically charged with the murder of Lieutenant Warren O. Grimm. Elmer Smith, an attorney for the defendants, is charged with being an accessory before the fact in that he is alleged to have procured, aided, counseled, incited, conspired and abetted the others in the alleged conspiracy to shoot the former service men.

The others are: Britt Smith, O. C. Bland, Bert Franklin, Ray Becker, James McInerney, Loren Roberts, Eugene Barnett, Mike Sheehan, John Lamb and Bert Bland. John Doe Davis and Ole Hanson also are named in the information but have not been apprehended.

Montesano, a lumber town of about 2,500 population, was selected for the scene of the trial when attorneys for the defendants made claims that a fair trial was impossible in Lewis county in which the shooting occurred. It is the county seat of Gray's Harbor county, about 12 miles from the city of Aberdeen.

Besides a regular venire of eighty, a special venire of 300, all from Gray's Harbor county, has been impaneled. It has been estimated that trial will consume as much as ten weeks.

ANTI-POOL HALL LAW INEFFECTIVE

Austin, Tex., Jan. 26.—Except for less than a week in December, court action has prevented enforcement of the Texas anti-pool hall law since it became effective May 1, 1919.

Passed by the state legislature a year ago, the law would prohibit the operation of pool halls, but its effectiveness was stayed by a temporary injunction granted by the federal court in Dallas, restraining its enforcement.

Under this restraining order, pool halls operated as usual throughout the state, until a special federal court at Fort Worth dissolved the order December 11. Pool halls then were closed until less than a week later the United States supreme court granted a stay order, effective until January 26, 1920.

When the law went into effect last May, licenses had been paid on 2,521 pool and billiard tables in the state, as against 3,167 in 1918. The license fee was \$20 a table. After May 1 the state's attorney general held collection of license money illegal under the law, and many pool tables were operated without payment of license after the restraining order was granted in Dallas.

The law provides a penalty of not less than a \$25 fine or more than \$100 or confinement in the county jail for not less than thirty days or more than one year, or both fine and imprisonment.

Hara Promises To Support Conference

Tokio, Jan. 2.—Premier Hara has promised his support for a conference of the Japan-American relations committee, composed of Japanese and Americans, to be held here next spring. Baron Shibusawa has announced that he expects the conference to contribute to the solution of the anti-Japanese agitation in California and in the United States. The American section of the committee was organized in the United States when Baron Shibusawa visited that country in 1915. After his return home the Japanese section was organized in Tokyo with more than a score of prominent Japanese business men to co-operate with the American members.

The meeting of the committee now has been called here for the exchange of frank opinions regarding diplomatic, economic and other questions arising between Japan and

the United States. It is expected that about 15 men including five or six from California and the others from the eastern states will come to Tokyo to attend the meeting.

Government approval of the proposed conference was given at a reception recently held at the residence of the premier. Many leading Japanese attended to exchange views on the promotion of friendly relations and a better understanding between the nations. Among them were Baron Shibusawa, Baron Sakatani, Baron Kondo, Manzo Kushida, Zenjiro Horikoshi, Junnosuke Inouye, governor of the bank of Japan; Chuji Kajiwara, president of the Yokohama Specie bank; Baron Mesata, Viscount Kaneko and Dr. Juichi Soyeda.

The premier said he believed the conference would contribute to the advancement of friendliness between Japan and the United States and that he and other members of the cabinet had decided to give every possible support to it.

WOULD REFOREST SPRUCE LAND

Marquette, Mich., Jan. 26.—Plans for reforestation of spruce and balsam producing lands in Michigan, so the state may have a more adequate supply of raw material for production of print paper, are being considered by the Michigan public domain commission.

John Baird, state game warden, has declared that spruce for paper mills can be grown in one-third of the time required for development of saw-

timber and he declares that with proper planting a new crop would be available every year.

A special committee appointed by the public domain committee to consider the plan includes Coleman C. Vaughan, secretary of state; Junius E. Beall, regent of the University of Michigan, and Prof. Filbert Roth of the same university.

CONDEMN BOLSHIEVISM
