The Republicans met in the district court room and at 3 o'clock this afternoon had unanimously elected George Kaneen of Grand Forks as permanent chairman.

### FOUR INDICTED IN LIQUOR CASE

#### Charged With Transporting 1,236 Quarts of Whiskey Into United States.

Duluth, Minn., July 21.—Deputy United States Marshal Frank L. Bradley, Chief of Police John Murphy and Frank Schaefer entered pleas of not guilty when arraigned before Judge Page Morris in United States district court here this afternoon, charged with transporting liquor which they knew to have been illegally brought in from Canada. Their bonds were fixed at a total of \$5,000.

Pleas of not guilty were entered this afternoon in behalf of Adolph James, Fred, Albert and Oesle Leonard, Harry Smith, Louis Alexander, Louis Arsenault and Harold Clark, all charged with having transported liquor from Canada at Ranier, Minn. Rube Grimoldby of International Falls was fined \$100 for violation of the national prohibition law.

### Has Received No Orders To Relinquish Authority

Washington, July 21.—Ignacio D. Calderon, Bolivian minister to the United States, said today that he had received no orders to relinquish authority over the legation here. In forwarding his resignation last week to the new government at La Paz, however, he announced that his archives have been turned over to the secretary of the legation, the minister declared.

### GIRL GAVE POLICE HOT CHASE THROUGH STREETS AND STORES

One young girl picked up as an undesirable to be sent out of town away from the bright lights of the fair gave a huge part of the Grand Forks police department a merry chase Tuesday afternoon.

She had been arrested and taken to the police station, and was being escorted through the basement of the city hall to a cell by Miss Mary Berg, police woman, when she made a sudden break for liberty, dashing out of the building and down Fourth street.

Miss Berg, one of two policemen and several firemen dashed in pursuit.

The girl, who proved to be a real sprinter, ran down Fourth street to Alpha avenue, and then turned over to Third street, reaching which she dashed into Lewis Bros. grocery store, and while the customers stood aghast raced through the establishment, out of the back door, down the alley, and through the Spriggs plumbing establishment to Fourth street where she finally collapsed, and was picked up by the police who had been in furious pursuit.

"You're too speedy for this town," remarked Miss Berg, as she started the young lady on her journey Tuesday night.

### ARRANGEMENTS FOR FERGUSON FUNERAL NOT GIVEN OUT YET

No arrangements for the funeral of Clinton Ferguson, who died at a hospital in Minneapolis Tuesday, had been made at an early hour this afternoon.

Mr. Ferguson is the son of Mr. and Mrs. P. J. Ferguson, 128 1/2 South Third street, Grand Forks, and was born in this city 27 years ago. He is well known here, having been prominent in athletics while attending high school at this place. Shortly after completing his high school course Clinton Ferguson entered the employ of a concern in Minneapolis and later married a girl from Dayton, Ohio.

Mr. Ferguson served on a submarine during the war, where it is believed he contracted tuberculosis which caused his death. Besides his parents and wife the deceased is survived by a brother, Roy Ferguson, of Minneapolis.

At 4:14, however, Shamrock began picking up on Resolute, gaining six or 50 yards to a mile. Six miles from the finish the challenger was 200 yards astern.

At 4:25 Shamrock had reduced Resolute's lead to 300 yards with the finish less than six miles ahead. The wind still held about nine knots.

Observers ashore reported that at 4:30 Resolute led Shamrock by about 25 seconds, the time being taken as the two yachts passed a fixed point of vision.

Shamrock's spinnaker seemed to be drawn better than the defender's, but notwithstanding her greater sail area, the Lipton craft seemed to be making a futile stern chase.

At 4:40 Resolute was still leading by 200 yards with less than five miles to go. The wind had dropped to six knots.

At 4:48 the yachts were within three miles of the finish and Resolute was leading by 250 yards. The wind held well.


