Prohibitionists Will Select Vice President Nominee.

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RUNNING MATE FOR BRYAN IS TO BE NAMED

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CHIEF AMONG THE PLANKS BEING REDRAFTED WERE THOSE DEALING WITH THE LEAGUE, AGRICULTURE, PROFITEERING AND COMMERCE.

Chief among the planks being redrafted were those dealing with the League, agriculture, profiteering and commerce. A plank calling for a world tribunal, but not especially the Versailles treaty, was adopted by the committee. Members reserved the right to offer amendments on the convention floor, however, and indications are there will be a fight.

INDICATIONS WERE THAT THE PLATFORM WOULD CONTAIN A CLEAR-CUT DECLARATION AGAINST ANY LESS STRINGENT ENFORCEMENT OF THE EIGHTEENTH AMENDMENT THAN NOW PROVIDED BY THE VOLSTEAD ACT.

As a running mate for William Jennings Bryan, the name of Miss Brehm was chosen by the delegates at the convention and after presiding with vigor over its deliberations all afternoon, yielded the chair and placed Bryan in nomination.

Indications were that the platform would contain a clear-cut declaration against any less stringent enforcement of the eighteenth amendment than now provided by the Volstead act, and a brief plank setting forth the party's sympathy "with just" claims of labor. A League of Nations plank pledged the strongest possible support to farmers and that concerning profiteering was a vigorous denunciation of speculation.
