

POLITICAL SYMPOSIUM HELD AT U

Harding Wins Out Over Cox By Vote of 147 to 74 at Convocation.

Students at the university enjoyed a novel convocation hour this morning, a symposium on the question of "Whom Shall I Vote For—Cox or Harding?" being held.

McLain Johnson, first speaker on the program, gave his support to Senator Harding, stating that the only way in which any kind of a league of nations could be formed was through the election of Harding.

Fred Aandahl urged the election of Harding. "The Democratic administration," he stated, "has been unable to carry out its plans and has lost not only the confidence of the American public but the confidence of the foreign nations."

Heber L. Edwards, the final speaker on the program, gave an excellent plea in behalf of Governor Cox. "I support the Republican party after it has used the welfare of the nation to further its own interests, which it did in opposing President Wilson after the armistice was signed."

Dean Squires announced before the vote was taken that it was not to be made upon the merits of the speeches but upon the personal conviction of the voter.

FAWCETT IN AIR SERVICE

Local Man Now Captain in U. S. Regular Army's Aero Squadron.

Roscoe Fawcett, formerly a Grand Forks newspaperman, but of late years sporting editor of The Portland Oregonian, has resigned from that paper to enter the United States air service.

He has received a commission as captain in the air service, regular army, and already has reported for duty at Vancouver Barracks, Wash.

During the war, Captain Fawcett commanded the 42nd Aero Squadron, stationed most of the time at home defense aerodromes near London.

He was seriously injured and his mechanical was killed when their plane fell in fog as they were carrying dispatches from London to Paris shortly before the end of the war.

Captain Fawcett is well known here. He was graduated from the local high school and attended the university. He was prominent in athletics, being especially successful in football.

After he was mustered out of the service shortly after the end of the war, Captain Fawcett visited in Grand Forks en route to Portland.

BLOOD STAINS ON GRASS BRING ABOUT ARREST OF BUTCHERS

Fort Yates, N. D., Oct. 27.—Blood-stained grass where a calf had been killed and dragged, led to the arrest of two confessed cat butchers and two others under arrest charged with being implicated in a big cattle butchering brought to light this week.

John Bendickson and John Martel of Fort Yates, have confessed the crime and are awaiting passing of sentence. Mr. and Mrs. Jake Jordan, implicated in the written confession of the men, are held for trial.

Bendickson and Martel had been employed as hired men at the Jordan farm.
