

MANY ENROLL IN ARTS COLLEGE

Increase of 46 Per Cent Made in This Course at State "U"

An unusual increase in the number of students enrolled in the College of Liberal Arts at the University of North Dakota, has been made this year, according to figures given out from the registrar's office. Forty-six per cent more students have registered in that college this fall than in 1921, though the number in 1921 was the highest recorded in previous years.

A total of 713 students were enrolled in Arts the close of last week, H. W. Patmore, registrar, states. The number enrolled at the corresponding time last year was 488, showing the increase this year to be 225.

Until Saturday noon 1279 students were registered at the institution in all colleges. This number shows an increase of 177 over 1921. Figures by colleges are: Graduate 10, Arts 713, Education 260, Engineering 146, Law 31, Medicine 38, High schools 82. Figure by classes are: Senior 165, Junior 213, Sophomores 366, Freshmen 402, specials 41.

A total of 697 men have been enrolled and 532 women.

O'KEEFE TALKS TO CLUB DIRECTORS ON PAVING COSTS

Mayor Henry O'Keefe appeared before the directors of the Commercial club at their regular session today at noon and outlined to them the cost of the contemplated street railway improvements, including the repairing of the tracks, and in connection, the laying of pavement in the south end of the city. Mr. O'Keefe discussed the project at some length, dealing with the situation from the standpoint of a continuance of the street railway service.

The board went on record as favoring the remittance of bank checks at par, in voting on the referendum submitted recently by the United States chamber of commerce.

President R. Carey announced the appointment of J. H. McNicol and J. R. Poupore as members of a committee to investigate in connection with the lining of a dam across the Red river at this point.

Attention of the Commercial club members is drawn to the general meeting to be held on Wednesday evening, at which time the traffic situation will be taken up by J. W. Goodman, new manager of the traffic department.

EDUCATORS COMING FOR INSTITUTE TO BE HELD NEXT WEEK

A corps of four state educators will come to Grand Forks to assist with the county institute for teachers which will be held in the court house from October 9 to 13, inclusive, Miss Beatrice Johnstone, county superintendent, said today. Miss Johnstone, with Miss Helen Davies will conduct the institute.

This corps of instructors, representing the state department of education, will present a uniform plan of work, at the various county institutes in the state during the fall, it is announced.

According to present indications, the second part of the course of study, adopted in this state, will be ready for presentation to the teachers attending the institute here. The new civic outline, of which C. L. Young of Bismarck is the author, also will be presented during the session here, Miss Johnstone expects.

MAY OPEN BIDS ON DITCH PROJECT

Bids on the proposed \$21,000 drainage ditch in Rye and Perry townships will be opened at the quarterly meeting of the board of county commissioners, scheduled for Tuesday at the city house, it was said today.

In view of the fact that the project has attracted the attention of a number of eastern bonding firms, which have been securing information on bonding phase of the project, it is expected that a number of these firms will send representatives to the meeting on Tuesday.

SEVERAL TRAINS ON GREAT NORTHERN REINSTATED TODAY

Great Northern passenger trains which were taken out of service on July 15, were re-instated today, and the service was resumed, as formerly, according to information from the office of the chief dispatcher, F. E. Gerish.

The trains re-instated today were taken out of service because of light traffic, and also because of difficulty in keeping rolling equipment in condition to the strike, it was said.

Nos. 111 and 112 will again run between Grand Forks and Fargo, leaving here in the morning and returning in the evening. Nos. 137 and 138, which have been operating tri-weekly on the Neche and Morden line, will be put back into daily service on the Neche line. Nos. 33 and 34, the Duluth trains, which have been operating only on week days since the July 15 change, will again run on Sunday, beginning October 8. It is understood that a tri-weekly

train to replace Nos. 137 and 138 on the Morden line will be put into service, but details have not yet been announced. Further increases and changes in service on the Dakota division are to be announced later, it was said.
