ARM BROKEN IN 6 PLACES. Flexton, N. FLEXTON TO SPEND \$2,800. Flexton, N. D., Oct. 3.—The 1922 budget of the village of Flexton calls for total appropriations of \$2,800 during the present fiscal year. General lights and roads and bridges are the largest items in the budget.

GETS SUSPENDED SENTENCE. Stanley, N. D., Oct. 3.—Pending the good behavior of Rubert Baumgartner, he will not have to serve a 15-day jail sentence, levied on him following his arrest on a charge of being drunk and disorderly. Harry Johnston and Herman Piepho were also fined, but not given sentences. Adolph Piepho is under bonds to appear Oct. 7, to answer a charge of having intoxicating liquors in his possession.

THREE STOLEN CARS RECOVERED

Minot, N. D., Oct. 3.—Recovery of three stolen Cadillac touring automobiles, two at Sherwood and another at Scooby, Mont., where they had been purchased by prominent citizens was announced Monday by the Minot police, who co-operated with the department of justice agents in identifying the stolen cars.

All of the cars had been stolen out of Minneapolis and St. Paul and driven to this part of the northwest, where they were sold to persons at an unusually low figure, the authorities declare.

The two Sherwood machines have been seized by the authorities and returned to Minneapolis, but the Scooby car is held there pending the arrival of authorities who will perhaps drive it back to the cities. One of the cars had been sold to a Sherwood doctor and the other to a confectioner there, it is said.

Although all the viable numbers on the two cars seized at Sherwood had been "rung up" or changed over, the autos were identified by the serial numbers which the thieves had not discovered and consequently had not altered.

The automobiles were stolen several weeks ago, authorities say, and the previous owners have been paid the insurance which they carried on them to protect themselves against theft. Secret operatives of the federal department of justice are known to be working on the case.

CHILD INJURED. Thief River Falls, Oct. 3.—Little Stanley Ryan, 6 years old, fell from the school wagon on the playground and breaking his arm just above the elbow and also dislocating the elbow joint.

The full extent of the injury was not ascertained before evening and it will be necessary to have an x-ray of the parts before anything can be done to straighten the arm.

RED LAKE JEWS OBSERVE HEBREW NEW YEAR'S DAY. Red Lake Falls, Minn., Oct. 2.—For the first time in the history of this city Jewish observance of the new year, held and some fifteen Jews from Red River Valley towns assembled for the annual observance which were held in the Odd Fellows hall with Sam Rosen and Max Ingber as acting rabbis.

The visitors were guests of Mr. Ingber while here. Even more visitors were here than in the previous year, services which began Sunday night.

TEACHERS SECURED. Thief River Falls, Oct. 3.—According to reports sent in by the respective office, the rural schools of Pennington county received by Supt. Geo. Gunderson, 53 of the 74 schools operating in the county have employed their teachers for the coming year.

There are 76 rural schools in Pennington county all told but two are not operated. The wages of the rural teachers who have been employed here range from \$80 to \$100 per month, with an average of between \$85 and \$90.

ALLEGED YEGG RELEASED. Minot, N. D., Oct. 3.—J. W. O'Brien, said by the police to be an I. W. W. organizer, and who was suspected of participating in the robbery of several trains, was released from the Des Moines penitentiary, where he had been held on a charge of vagrancy. The authorities were unable to get sufficient evidence to hold him on the robbery charge, they say. He has been one of the "trustees" about the city jail, and according to the police, has made no attempt to escape.

HAS PLACED 3,000 WORKERS. Minot, N. D., Oct. 3.—Approximately 3,000 laborers have been placed by the Minot labor bureau during the period of its operation this year, both under federal and state control, according to an announcement today by Clyde Nelson, in charge of the bureau, which has been closed for the year under orders of Joseph A. Kitchen, state commissioner of agriculture and labor.

HIGH JACKERS NOT CAUGHT. Minot, N. D., Oct. 3.—No trace had been found by authorities today of the three desperadoes who Thursday night "high-jacked" an entire party of transient laborers, riding on a freight train between Karmore and Minot, taking all valuables that the men had on them, including even their razors and other similar personal effects, as well as whatever money was available.

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
