The Legislature.

SACRAMENTO, March 10.—The Assembly met at 10 A. M., and took up the general appropriation bill as reported, with amendments from the Ways and Means Committee of the Whole.

The Senate took up the Bank Commissioners' bill. Considered in Committee of the Whole. Craig offered an amendment, providing that only one Commissioner be appointed, instead of three.

When Bones Will Resign.

SACRAMENTO, March 19.—Senator Bones says, with regard to the proposition of the Alameda Workingmen, that he resigns, that he will consider the matter and return an answer two years from the first of April next.

Result of the Marryville Elections.

MARYSVILLE, March 19.—Full returns give Rideout, the People's candidate for Mayor, 395 majority. The Citizens and Workingmen elect Casad, Marshal; Fitzgerald, Assessor and Bingham, Treasurer, by majorities of 156, 105 and 47, respectively.

Valley Election.

VALLEJO, March 19.—The municipal election passed off very quietly yesterday, only 1,032 votes being polled, against 1,417 at the county election of last Fall. The Republicans elect six Trustees, the Marshal and the City Assessor, and three School Directors, the Superintendent of Schools and School Assessor. One School Director and one trustee of the Democratic and Workingmen's ticket were elected. The Republican candidate for City Assessor was elected over both the Democratic and Workingmen's tickets. This gives the Republicans a clean sweep with the exception of two officers. The vote for marshal, which is probably a fair party test, was as follows: McDonald (Republican), 419; Wilson (Democrat), 240; Fagin (Workingman), 849.

Shot in a Row.

VIRGINIA, (Nev.), March 19.—About eleven o'clock last evening Jack Nagle, foreman of the Belcher, got into a row with Dennis Callahan at a dinner in Gold and the trouble began in the ball room, and was settled outside with pistols. Nagle's shot missed Callahan and entered the bowels of Ned Boyle, foreman of the Alta. Boyle will die before the day is out.

Congressional Doings Yesterday.

WASHINGTON, March 19.—House—Bills introduced: By Vance, granting pensions to soldiers who enlisted out of prison; also for the payment of certain Southern mail contractors. By Vance, providing that no shall be paid which has heretofore been paid by the Confederate Government.

By Money, granting alternate sections of land to the State of Mississippi to aid in the construction of the Ship Island, Ripley & Kentucky Railroad.

By Gibson, for the appointment of a commission to ascertain as to the terms of a treaty of commerce with Mexico can be arranged.

By Monroe, relating to telegraphic communication between the United States and foreign countries.

By Lamson, proposing an amendment to the Constitution providing that the President shall be elected by direct vote of the people.

By Conger, repealing the law appropriating three hundred and twenty-five thousand dollars for the payment of certain Southern mail contractors.

By Cox, of New York, for the erection of a monument over the grave of Thomas Jefferson.

Mayhew, of the District of Columbia Committee, reported a bill investing the District Commissioners with the power of the late Board of Auditors, for the purpose of auditing the claims of the Board, but for which no certificate had been prepared; also that outstanding certificates issued by the Board of Auditors which shall hereafter be issued by the Commissioners shall be convertible into three-sixty-five bonds. The bill was referred to the Committee of the Whole and then the House solved itself into such committee.

By Stenger in the Chair, for the purpose of considering the bill. E. Ben opposed it. He sometimes heard about paying Southern claims, but he never had seen a batch of claims that he thought so little of as the mass of rotten claims which came up from the purloins of the old Washington ring. After further discussion the Committee, without action, adjourned.

SENATE—Farland, from the Committee on Territories, reported favorably a joint resolution disapproving of the act of the Territory of Arizona granting a charter to the Southern Pacific Railroad Company passed the seventh of February, 1877. Placed on the calendar.

By Hereford, to recognize and pay certain claims due by the State of West Virginia to citizens thereof for services rendered in suppressing the late Rebellion.

By Estlin, to authorize States to impose a tonnage tax charge or duty on vessels to maintain quarantine. Window, from the Committee on Appropriations, reported with amendments the House bill author-

izing the Secretary of the Treasury

to employ temporary clerks and making appropriations for the same; also making an appropriation for detaching from public land; for leasing into market public lands in certain States and for other purposes. Placed on the calendar.

Spencer submitted an amendment to consult and appropriate bills as follows: Provided that before any part of the appropriation provided for in this Act shall become available, the appointments in consular and diplomatic service shall be so arranged as to be equally distributed between the several States of the United States, Territories and the District of Columbia, according to population.

Allison called up the Senate bill authorizing the Secretary of the Interior to make certain negotiations with the Ute Indians in the State of Colorado, for the consolidation of all bands into one agency, to be located on White River.

Edmunds inquired where Congress received the power to authorize any one to make treaties except the President of the United States.

Allison moved to amend the bill so as to authorize the President to make negotiations instead of the Secretary of the Interior. Agreed to.

A Victory for San Diego Harbor.

WASHINGTON, March 19.—Some weeks ago Representative Ross of New Hampshire, one of the most determined opponents of the Texas-Pacific project, requested the Superintendent of the Coast Survey to order a new survey of San Diego harbor. The expectation was that the harbor had deteriorated in commercial value. Senator Sargent's attention being called to the matter he wrote to Superintendent Patterson requesting that special care be taken to make this survey thorough and absolutely reliable. He is to-day in receipt of an official communication in which Patterson says:

The maps of re-surveys of that portion of San Diego harbor between La Playa and New San Diego have been received. I have had a comparison made between it and the survey of 1850 to ascertain what, if any, changes have taken place during the intervening 24 years. I am very glad to find by this comparison that there has been no change of consequence, and that the curves of six, twelve and eighteen feet surveyed receiving the discharge of the San Diego river, now turned, has been considered a very critical part of the harbor. I hope in a few days to receive the re-survey of the bar.

Small Turmoil to Quebec.

QUEBEC, March 18.—St. Patrick's procession to-day has been smaller than of late years past. Several societies refused to take part on account of the action of the paraders in failing to salute the Lieutenant Governor.

Looking Extremely Warlike.

LONDON, March 19th.—England has protest-d at St. Petersburg against the Russian advance on the Straits. Turkey will remain neutral in case of a struggle between England and Russia. Russian troops are reported concentrating on the Austrian frontier. The Austrian delegation to-day granted the demand of the Minister of War, 6,000 florins for military stores.

THE MEXICAN QUESTION.

NEW YORK, March 19.—The Herald's Washington special thinks that Schleicher's committee will recommend that Diaz be recognized. Evidence taken by the Committee shows that the other raids have greatly diminished in number since the accession of President Diaz. We have now on our border 5,000 troops, and this number is found to be sufficient to hold the line. If Diaz should encourage immigration into Mexico by offering protection to public improvements and to private enterprise, he would do much, it is thought, to settle the question. Nobody here desires to require any territory from Mexico.
