The Pelican Cleared. SAN FRANCISCO, April 3.—In accordance with instructions received from the authorities at Washington, Captain Sisson ordered the Costa Rican steamer "Yrazu," late "Pelican," clearance papers this morning. This afternoon shipping articles were signed by officers and crew and the steamer will probably sail to-morrow morning for Costa Rica. She carries no cargo except stores and coal.

Stock Counterfeiters in the Toils. SAN FRANCISCO, April 3d.—Capt. Lees and Detective Jones have been for some months on the trail of two men named Chas. H. and G. Crawford, who were seeking to induce a certain lithographer to execute certificates of Ophir and Eureka Consolidated stock. The lithographer himself gave the information. He was instructed to delay the work until the case could be fully worked up. Some time ago Chas. H. Crawford left the State, taking with him considerable money furnished by his principals, for the purpose of obtaining bogus stock. G. Crawford continued the plot to make a false issue. Yesterday, by preconcerted arrangements, the bogus stock was delivered to Crawford, who, on leaving the premises, was at once arrested. Two hundred and fifty blank certificates of Ophir were found on him and, as those were all he had received none can be got on the market. At his room were found twelve blank certificates of Eureka Consolidated, stolen at the time the books were printed; also types and figures for stamping certificates with dividers and assessment marks; also forged signatures of C. L. McCoy, Secretary of the Ophir, and E. A. Richardson, one of the Trustees of the Company. It is understood that several prominent men of the city are implicated in the design. Crawford was formerly in the employ of Berry, Wolfskill & Co., and is about 28 years of age and of prepossessing appearance.

Washington Joins. WASHINGTON, April 3d.—The Navy Department has received advice that certain American vessels in the South Pacific are engaged in the coffee trade. The subject is under Cabinet consideration. Sargent's timber land bill has been reported from Committee with amendment providing that the penalties shall take effect in ninety days and that the bill should be amended to provide for the consideration of the Railroad Sinking Fund bill.

The House took up the report of the Committee regarding Door-keeping Bill, and Harrison explained the report, holding that Polk had exceeded the law in his appointments.

The United States as a Power-Maker. NEW YORK, April 3.—A special from Washington says that several Senators have of late discussed among themselves the propriety of preparing a joint resolution which should express deep regret on the part of the people of the United States at the prospect of the serious misunderstanding and interruption of peaceful relations between the people of Great Britain and of Russia, and request the President to use all means, as far as he can consistently with his constitutional duty, to aid in restoring relations of amity and confidence between the two Governments and peoples. It is proposed to discuss with Secretary Everts the propriety or usefulness of such a joint resolution before it is drawn up.

The White House Banquet. WASHINGTON, April 3.—In regard to the resolutions of the Maryland Legislature to contest the title of President Hayes, prominent Democrats in Congress say that they do not believe there are ten Representatives, and not a single Democratic Senator in favor of them. Montgomery Blair, however, is industriously at work in Congress to propose a resolution, and it is proposed to discuss with Secretary Everts the propriety or usefulness of such a joint resolution before it is drawn up.

Congressional. WASHINGTON, April 3d.—SEN. ATE-Chatte introduced a bill to amend the Pacific Railroad Act of 1862 and the acts supplementary. Laid on the table to go with the pending Funding bill. House—Banks, from the Committee on Rules, reported back the resolution admitting one Representative of each public journal which employs a permanent correspondent for reporting the proceedings of Congress to the halls and passage-ways around the hall of the House. Adopted. Consideration was then resumed of the case of Polk, doorkeeper of the House.

War Movements.

CONSTANTINOPLE, April 2.—The Russians have commenced a fresh movement on Gallipoli. They have demanded possession of the fortifications on both sides of the upper Bosphorus, and at Gallipoli and Boulair on the Dardanelles. The Sultan has refused their demands thus far.

LONDON, April 2.—Hungary is preparing for mobilization. Serbia is showing a disposition to side with Austria. The Assassination of Lord Leitrim. NEW YORK, April 3.—A dispatch to the Tribune from Dublin states that the assassination of Lord Leitrim and his two attendants was the result of agrarian troubles. Lord Leitrim had a dispute lately with his tenantry, some of whom manifested much bitter feeling at their alleged grievances. There is intense indignation among the people of Donegal County over the outrage, and measures are being taken to discover the perpetrators.

Another Chance for Adjustment. LONDON, April 3.—Stocks are flat, particularly Russian securities. This morning's news shows very little change in the Eastern question. Dispatches from Baden and St. Petersburg state that there is ground for expecting a renewal of the Congress negotiations on the basis of the proposal of Bismarck, that the powers be invited to meet and revise the treaties of 1856 and 1871. Such an overture from Germany would spare Russian susceptibilities, but it is improbable that Russia will take any step, or come to any decision until Ignatieff has reported.

The stories that the Russians have made a demand for the surrender of the Turkish position on the Bosphorus are attributed to a regular manufacturer in Constantinople for the purpose of provoking England and Austria against Russia.

More Warlike Dispatches. VIENNA, April 3.—A dispatch from St. Petersburg reports great excitement over the news of a probable alliance between England and Turkey. Everything has assumed a warlike aspect. It is reported that the Russians are advancing on Gallipoli.

LONDON, April 3.—It is again reported that the English fleet is about to enter the Bosphorus to counteract any designs of the Russians towards the occupation of Turkish strongholds.

The Salisbury Circular—Romanian Hostile to Russia. LONDON, April 3.—Vienna papers are commenting on Salisbury's circular to the powers, say that Austria and England are agreed regarding Salisbury's criticism of the treaty of San Stefano and the steps necessary to protect the interests of both States, and express the conviction that only by the deference of Russia to Salisbury's views can war between England and Russia be avoided.

A special from Berlin says Russia's reply to Lord Salisbury's circular is preparing. Prince Gortschakoff is said to be anxious to issue it as soon as possible, so as to remove the unfavorable impression produced by the English circular. The Russian newspapers complain of the increasing hostility of the Romanians. The latter are said to be hindering the passage of Russian provision columns through their territory, and to have threatened to forbid it altogether.
