FOREPAUGH.

Splendid Procession and Performances to Two Crowded Houses—Capital Range of Equestrian, Acrobatic and General Business—That Famous Baby Elephant.

The entrance into Los Angeles yesterday of Adam Forepaugh's Menagerie, Museum and Circus was one of the most gorgeous affairs of the kind ever chronicled in this or any other country. Forepaugh's arrangements are on a tremendous scale, and in their suggestions of expense indicate a Monte Cristo or a Crossus rather than a showman. It required a good sized "bonanza" to furnish forth the triumphal chariot which graces his processions, and the innumerable smaller vehicles were only less splendid than that acme of circus cars. It is hardly necessary to say that everything was in keeping with what one would expect of a man who sends his advance agents around in a superb palace car.

Of course our country cousins were on hand in great numbers yesterday. Both the afternoon and evening performances were enjoyed by audiences which tested to the utmost the capacity of the enormous tent.

Forepaugh's Menagerie and Museum carries out the proclamation of his flaming bills to the letter. It is probably the largest, finest and most expensive single collection possessed by any living showman. Nothing approaching it has ever hitherto appeared on the Pacific Coast. The only male hippopotamus in America was duly admired by the wondering thousands, the rhinoceros flaunted his thick and gross hide, the cynosure of all eyes; and, passing over the elephants of enormous size, the baby elephant, born a year ago last February, was on hand, the trump card of the whole menagerie outfit.

It was as playful as a kitten, and exchanged courtesies with every one disposed to pet it. The grand entrance is spirited and picturesque. A magic barrel act by Lew Leslie is an exceedingly neat piece of business. This was followed by some consummately skillful equestrianism by Mr. Wm. Dutton, varied by Mr. Tom Barry as clown. Barry is a lucious fellow and brought down the house repeatedly by his merry quips. The refrain of his "Whoo Emma" will echo amongst our gamins for a long time to come. Act 4 introduced some very superior acrobatic feats, and the aerial flights of the Messrs. Hawley and Forepaugh extorted repeated applause, as they deserved to do. The trick horse Mahomet is a marvel of equine cleverness. The principal equestrienne act, by Mademoiselle Burdeau, was graceful and spirited and proved the lady to be an exquisite horsewoman. As a contortionist "Young Ajax," described in the bills as "The Boundless Wonder and Human Enigma," is without a superior in the whole range of the arena. With Milie. Burdeau appeared as clown Mr. John Hart, whose make-up was decidedly and uniquely clever, and who sustained his comic personnel by some sidesplitting farcicalities.

The most notable feature of the evening's entertainment was the herd of performing elephants introduced by Addie Forepaugh, Jr. They were formed into pyramids announced by Addie, played organs, saw-sawed, mounted on pedestals, walked on three legs, danced a quadrille and showed themselves to be under the highest possible state of discipline, exhibiting an advanced stage of animal intelligence withal. This department of the show is sensationally good.

Mr. Munroe at the afternoon performance acquitted himself in a masterly manner. In the evening, owing to the nervousness of the horses, which have just come out of their winter quarters, Munroe's success was not so great as his skill should have secured him. The audience appreciated the situation and recognized the ineffectual though persevering skill of the rider. Act five, as the bounding jockey, was a huge success. We take the show for all in all, we can truthfully pronounce it unparallel.

A meeting of the Directors of the Horticultural Society was held yesterday. Initial steps were at once taken for the erection of a Horticultural Pavilion. The appropriation of \$2,500 by the Legislature will be a material help towards the successful completion of the project. Our "solid" men have announced their determination to contribute liberally. A gentleman from Santa Barbara promised that there should be at least twenty-five contributors in sums of twenty-five dollars each from that county. We have no doubt but that we shall receive hearty aid from the whole of Southern California. The Horticultural Pavilion may, therefore, thanks to the Legislature and to the indefatigable efforts of the Messrs. L. M. Holt, T. A. Garey, and others, be reared in a fact accomplished. It will give a great impetus to horticultural operations in the Southern end of the State.

He informs us that there were thirty-five hundred persons at the circus last night and the attendance at the afternoon performance was the largest ever noted in Los Angeles. We suppose the audiences will be equally large this afternoon and evening.

In the matter of selecting site for County Hospital and Poor Farm—Supervisor Prager, Young and Hannon appointed a committee to examine the different localities and report to this Board at its May meeting.

Adjourned till 10 A. M. to-morrow.
