LONDON, May 28th.—Affairs at Constantinople begin to look less

dangerous. The advance of Russian cavalry on Pirinji, which the Turks understood to be an attempt to seize Pirinji, with a view to commanding the road to Kavak, is now disavowed by Gen. Todleben. Gen. Shouvaloff, who ordered the occupation of Pirinji, is declared to have exceeded his authority and committed an indiscretion. The Russians have withdrawn from Pirinji, and Gen. Todleben is said to be exceedingly careful to prevent anything at this moment which would cause a Russian retreat.

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Grasshoppers in Montana.

(From the Helena Herald.) Grasshoppers, in various localities, are reported hatched and hatching in myriads. In the grain sections of Meagher county, in the Prickly Pear Valley and elsewhere, the pests have shown their destructive instincts, devouring the wheat and all kinds of young vegetation. Farmers are flooding their fields and millions of the insects are in this manner drowned or swept away. Other methods are adopted to combat the encroaching insects, the most effective, perhaps, being that of scattering straw in the line of approach, setting fire to the same and singeing the hoppers to a helpless condition.
