The Election in San Francisco.

SAN FRANCISCO, June 19.—The election is proceeding very quietly owing to the great number of polling places. The crowds in attendance are small, and voting goes on briskly without the necessity for any delay. The Workingmen are making the greatest show of effort, and in the Tenth Ward women are peddling tickets and electioneering. Up to noon over ten thousand votes had been cast, and it is expected that the polling will be heavier during the afternoon. It is probable, however, that a light vote will be cast, and this will be in favor of the Workingmen, who will bring up all their men. Not a single disturbance has yet been reported.

No News at Military Headquarters.

SAN FRANCISCO, June 19.—At military headquarters there is no news from the front this morning.

The Election in Petaluma.

PETALUMA, June 19.—At noon only 200 votes had been cast. Full vote is nearly 1,000. Little interest is felt, and there will probably be a light vote throughout the county.

The Election in San Luis.

SAN LUIS OBISPO, June 19.—The election is progressing quietly. Preston, the Democratic nominee, has withdrawn, and the contest lies between Steele, Non-Partisan, and Henderson, Workingman. It is estimated that only sixty to seventy-five per cent. of a full vote in the county will be polled. The chances are in favor of Steele.

The Election in Oakland.

OAKDALE, Cal., June 19.—The election is quiet and the vote very light, owing to the busy season. The vote on the Workingmen's ticket will be especially light. The Republicans are generally supporting a Non-Partisan ticket, while Democrats are nearly a unit for the Democratic ticket, and will probably carry this county.

Election in Modesto.

MODESTO, June 19.—The election is very quiet. From present appearances there will be a light vote. The Democratic straight ticket, Republican Non-Partisan and Workingmen's straight are all being voted. The straight Democratic ticket is about twelve votes ahead.

Election at Shinglet Springs.

SHINGLET SPRINGS, June 19.—The election is progressing very quietly. A small vote will be cast. Non-Partisan, straight Democratic and Workingmen's tickets are in the field. The prospects are for the Non-Partisan and Workingmen will be very close.

Election at Pacheco.

PACHECO, June 19.—The struggle between the Democratic and Republican candidates is expected to be close in this county. The Non-Partisan ticket at large will be ahead, and Hamill, the Kearney candidate, last.

At Rocklin.

ROCKLIN, June 19.—The vote is very light. About 100 less votes are related this year than last. Non-Partisan ticket ahead.

The Election in Santa Cruz.

SANTA CRUZ, June 19.—The election is being conducted quietly. Workingmen are industriously at work. Indications are that Craig, Non-Partisan, will carry the county by a small majority. White, the Workingmen's nominee for the counties and Santa Cruz, Monterey and San Benito, is certain to be elected, the vote of the opposition being cast for J. W. Leigh and Julian Lee.

Congressional Bills.

WASHINGTON, June 18th.—The House of Representatives to-day unanimously concurred in the resolution which last month was also unanimously adopted by the Senate, relating that existing treaties with China should be modified so as to place some limit upon Chinese immigration, and inviting attention to the subject on the part of the Senate.

Proposals for Adoption by the Conference Committee.

WASHINGTON, June 19.—The House of Representatives to-day unanimously concurred in the resolution which last month was also unanimously adopted by the Senate, relating that existing treaties with China should be modified so as to place some limit upon Chinese immigration, and inviting attention to the subject on the part of the Senate.

House raised the point that there was not a question of privilege involved. The Speaker was about sustaining this point when Eden said that Pound had no right to misrepresent. If he (Pound) was here in the employ of the railroad corporations—[Calls of "Order" and great confusion.]

Pound—I demand that the gentleman's remarks be taken down charging me with being in the employ of the railroad corporations. The remarks were written out and read.

Pound—I move that the gentleman, unless he apologizes or retracts, be censured.

Eden—The only thing I meant by the remark was that the gentleman from Wisconsin appears to be an active partisan of the railroad corporations, legislating in their interests; not that he was an employed attorney of the railroad corporations.

The Speaker inquired if Pound was satisfied.

Pound—I am not. [Laughter.] The Speaker remarked, in a conciliatory spirit, that he had always believed that remarks which were determined out of order should not appear in the record, and that as this controversy had arisen in this matter, everything offensive had better be omitted from the record, as having been out of order.

Morrison said his colleague, Eden, had stated frankly what he meant, and if the House thought that the remark objected to should be omitted from the record there was no objection to the omission.

Finally it was decided that everything that had taken place should not appear in the record.

Ewing moved to suspend the rules and pass a bill to retire national bank notes and substitute treasury notes for them. Rejected; yeas, 109; nays 114. The result was greeted with applause on the Republican side.

A Long Session of the Conference Committee.

WASHINGTON, June 19.—The Committee of Conference on the Sundry Civil Appropriation Bill was in session all night and until six this morning, when a vote was taken, after reaching an agreement on only about one-third of the items in controversy. At 12:30 to-day the Committee was again at work.

The President's Movements.

WASHINGTON, June 19th.—The President and his wife will leave this evening, after the marriage of Miss Platt, for Princeton, N. J., to attend the commencement exercises of Princeton College.

Potter Committee Further Adjourned.

WASHINGTON, June 19.—Owing to the postponement of the adjournment of Congress until to-morrow, the Potter Investigating Committee has further postponed its meetings until to-morrow.

Bankruptcy and Sale.

TROY, June 19.—Edwin Andrews, cashier of the wrecked Central bank, Washington County, hanged himself to-day.

Additional Congressional Proceedings.

WASHINGTON, June 19.—Southard moved to suspend the rules and pass a bill that, on and after October 1st, 1878, legal tender notes of the United States shall be received at par in payment of customs duties. Agreed to; and bill passed; yeas, 133; nays, 53.

Haskell moved to suspend the rules and pass a bill providing that all pensions on account of death, wounds received, or disease contracted in the service of the United States during the late war shall commence from the date of death or discharges from the payment of arrears of pensions, and also providing that no claimant shall be entitled to any extra compensation for making application for arrears for pensions. Agreed to; yeas, 160; nays, 62.

The Congress.

LONDON, June 19th.—A Berlin correspondent states that Beaconsfield has resolved to remain until the close of Congress. Bismarck in Monday's sitting sketched a general plan for the arrangement of the questions and opened debate on Bulgaria. An animated discussion followed, but no result was reached.

The Situation at Rhodope.

LONDON, June 19.—General Tolben has refused to detach more troops against Rhodope insurgents in consequence of large reinforcements of Turks which have arrived at Constantinople.
