Woodland, June 20th.—The Non-Partisan, Democratic and Workingmen's tickets are running about even.

Placerville, June 20th.—The county stands for El Dorado County: Crawford, Non-Partisan, 27; Larkin, Workingman, 5; Dickenhoff, Independent, 19.

Colfax, June 20th.—At large, Workingmen, 84; Citizens, 55; Democrats, 7. County Delegate: Workingmen's candidates, Winters, 83; Thomas, 82; Citizens: Burt, 41; Fischer, 42.

Oakland, June 20th.—Fifteen precincts of Alameda County outside of Oakland give 647 for the Non-Partisan ticket and 390 for the Workingmen. Five precincts are yet to hear from.
