Arrived at Wilmington, July 11th, schooner Una, Stoddard, master, from Navarro river, with lumber for Banning & Co.

Messrs. Northcraft, Rse, McLean and Vitall, were last heard from at Hardyville, Arizona, all well and about to start for Prescott, via the Hackberry district.

Two distinct shocks of earthquake were felt at Santa Monica a little before 7 o'clock on Wednesday evening. An interval of a few seconds occurred between the first and second shocks.

Mr. R. R. Haines, Superintendent of Construction of the Western Union Telegraph Company, got back from a trip along the lines as far as Bakersfield by yesterday's overland train.

We are under obligation to Mr. Aaron Smith for a copy of the City Directory of Los Angeles, recently compiled by him. The work is very full and complete and will undoubtedly be of great service to our citizens.

Notes from the Seaside.

The fine surf bathing and invigorating ocean breezes have filled up Santa Monica cañon with pleasure seekers. There are thirty-eight boats flying the United States colors from the roof-pole, and the sound of the hammer and saw frightens the linnets and mocking birds in the sycamore trees.

The ladies ride horseback, pick up the beautiful mosses and shells, read novels and talk gossip, enjoying life without the cares of house-keeping, even if one does eat sand in the butter, and gets scared with imaginary bugs and rattlesnakes. In fact the watering place of the Pacific Coast is appreciated by such people as Judge Stevens, Mr. and Mrs. Weeks, of San Diego, Col. Kewen and wife, also of San Gabriel, and many more.

Brother Fisher's Outlook office is embowered with roses and vines. The branches of his bouquet rose measure twenty-two feet and it is only eight months old.

The park here is handsomely laid out, and altogether Santa Monica is a delightful summer resort.

Last Sunday a hundred excursionists went down to the ocean beach and enjoyed the delightful view of mountain, sky and sea.

Artesian Water. Some one in San Diego asked Professor Gunning, a short time since, what he thought would be the chance of finding artesian water at that place. He said "The presumptions were it could not be found, but he could not say for certain."

The petition of the Gas Company, asking for a loan of old hose for use in the neighborhood, was referred to the Committee on Fire and Water.

The offer of Eli Taylor to deed to the city land on the south side of Morgan Lane, to extend Los Angeles street south, was referred to the Board of Public Works.

The communication of Louis Roeder, in regard to chain gang contract, was referred to the same committee.

M. T. H. Smith was substituted as arbitrator in the Gray case, in place of V. E. Howard.

Petition of M. A. Marshall to erect a shed within the fire limits was referred to the Committee on Fire and Water.

The bid of W. J. Neely for Fort and Fourth street sewer, was received and contract and assessment approved.

Mr. Kercheval reported certain obstructions to sewers on Main street, near Ninth.

The agreement between J. J. Ayers and the city for pamphlets was approved.

Petition of certain parties to connect with Fort and Fourth street sewer was granted, to take effect as soon as the sewer is finished.

The Zanja's report of cost of repairs, \$100, was referred to the Zanja Committee.

The bills referred to the committee at the last meeting were returned approved, and they were ordered paid.

Council Proceedings.

LOS ANGELES, July 10th, 1878.

Council met in regular session yesterday evening, with Mayor MacDougal in the Chair. Present—Messrs. Green, Lips, Cohn, Jones, Apablaza, Mullaly, Kercheval and Hollenbeck. Minutes of the last meeting read and approved.

The report of the Mayor of License Collector's business was filed. The City Collectors report for June was as follows: Licenses collected, \$2,342; First street widening, \$992.43. Referred. The City Judge reported the collection of \$122 fines since last reported and presented the City Treasurer's receipt for the same. Referred.

The Health Officer reported that he had issued orders to have ninety nuisances abated. Ordered filed. The Special Committee reported on the redistricting of the city. Reports as amended was adopted, and the City Attorney was instructed to prepare an ordinance.

The Committee on Finance reported in favor of refunding \$439 taxes to Mr. Campbell. Adopted. The Committee on Water Supply recommended the issue of a bond of \$1,000 to Wm. Smith on reservoir No. 5 and the sale of a bond of \$1,000 for the Clerk for the General Irrigation Fund. Carried.

Mr. Cohn presented a map of the tunnel and proposed changes. Messrs. Lambie and Jackson, a special committee of engineers to examine the tunnel reported: To improve the alignment and facilitate the discharge of water, we find that it will be necessary to construct 576 feet of new tunnel as shown in the plan. We are still of the opinion that it will be necessary to timber about 1,600 feet of the tunnel. To still further facilitate the discharge of water we find that it would be necessary to construct within the tunnel 675 linear feet of flume or casing, which we estimate would cost about \$400.

Mr. Lips moved that the tunnel be accepted, provided Mr. Moore, the contractor, will make the tunnel correspond to the changes marked on the map presented. Adopted.

The Zanja Committee reported new instructions for the Zanjero. Adopted. The Deputy Zanjero was heard in relation to parties stealing water.

Mr. Lips moved that a Deputy Zanjero be appointed to watch the parties charged with stealing water in the vicinity of the Feliz Ranch. Carried.

The question of repairs to flume crossing the bridge was referred to the Zanja Committee, with power to act.

The petition of residents near Fruitland for repairs and changes of zanja No. 7 was referred to the Zanja Committee.

Mr. Lucas was heard, asking for water to irrigate 18 acres of land of the Moerenhaut tract out of zanja No. 4. Referred to the Zanja Committee.

A petition in regard to the sale of water to favorites near Fruitland was referred to the Zanja Committee, with request for proof of the allegations.

Petition for house for hook and ladder company was referred to the Committee on Fire and Water.

The petition of Wm. Smith, in regard to reservoir No. 5 and the dam, and reasons for delay in the work and the title of the road at that point, was referred to the Committee on Water Supply.

The petition of Louis Roeder, in regard to chain gang contract, was referred to the same committee.
