SAN FRANCISCO, July 16.-The Chamber of Commerce met at 2 o'clock and passed resolutions to the memory of Isaac Friedlander, of more than the usual complimentary character. Appropriate addresses were made.

Indian Fighting.

POINTLAND, Ogn., July 16.-J. H. Kuzio of Umattila telegraphed as follows to day: Our scouts who went out ten miles from here yesterday were fired upon by three Indians and had a bride and saddle cut by bullets. They returned the fire, killing the horse rode by the nearest Indian, who, aided by his comrades, made his escape. Col. Mizener's command returned here for transportation to the front, met at the Agency six miles beyond Pendleton. They leave here this morning, having obtained the necessary horses and teams. The Governor will send twenty-six mounted men belonging to the 1st Cavalry, volunteers, this evening, to Weston, in answer to a telegram received from Dr. Ogelsby, and as soon as horses can be got, will forward to the front more men of the same company. They are a fine body of efficient and well-offered men.

Heavy Fire in New Orleans.

NEW ORLEANS, July 16.-A fire last night on Palmyra and Preux streets destroyed eight houses, including the Madison street school for girls. Loss, about \$30,000. Assistant fireman Joseph W. Hartwell, and fireman Clair Cornaby, No. 5, were killed by falling walls.

The Progress of Reconstruction.

WASHINGTON, July 16.-It is understood that no formal opinion has been given by the Attorney-General to the Secretary of the Treasury concerning the exchange of gold for notes on the United States Treasury. Up to an exchange of views on this subject, the Secretary and Attorney-General agreed that this could not be done until the first of January. The Treasury Department holds the opinion, however, that it is lawful to pay gold on Government account at any time. The smaller gold coins are likely to get into circulation in this manner. The coin balance still shows a steady increase, and, at the present time, to-day, amounted to \$25,546,000.

Convening for German Elections.

LONDON, July 16.-The canvassing in Germany for elections for members of the Reichstag, to take place on the 30th inst., is quite heated. The struggle will be severe, especially in the larger towns, where daily meetings are held. It seems improbable that Bismarck can be strong enough in the new Parliament to dispense with the assistance of the National Liberals, on whom he has heretofore been entirely dependent.

Receiving their Representatives.

LONDON, July 16.-A number of Lords and members of the House of Commons go to Dover to-day to welcome the Berlin Plenipotentiaries. The Mayor and Corporation of Dover will present Lord Beaconsfield with an address of congratulation. A private train provided for the Plenipotentiaries will reach Charing Cross railway station at 4:45 o'clock. Lord Henry Lennox has charge of the organized reception of the plenipotentiaries at the station. All metropolitan conservative associations will be present by representation. No address will be made. All ministers who can be absent from Parliament will be at the platform at the station. Many liberal members of Parliament have applied for tickets to the platform, expressing a wish to make the demonstration national. Seats for 500 friends of the First Lord of the Admiralty have been erected within the Admiralty enclosure in Whitehall. Downing street will be reserved for members of Parliament, between Charing Cross and Downing street the general public will be admitted so that the spontaneity and warmth of the welcome will have to be judged by the demonstration of the plenipotentiaries. Traffic will be stopped from 4:15 until Beaconsfield's carriage passes. The Ministerial banquet at the Mansion House will take place on August 1. The date of the complimentary dinner tendered by the Carlton Club has not been determined. The western platform of Charing Cross Station, from which the carriage road runs, has been partitioned off, while rows of raised seats skirt one side, and banks of rare flowers rise on the other. Along that side of the carriage-way the platform is entirely hidden by flowers and the walls of the station at the entrance way are decorated with the flags of the nations participating in the Congress, and clusters of national devices and emblems. The Times says that Lord Beaconsfield will be welcomed to-day as the chief actor in one of the most honorable triumphs in the modern diplomacy of England.
