Julia and the Suro Tunnel.

SAN FRANCISCO, Aug. 23.-The reports heretofore published concerning a contract between the Suro Tunnel Co. and the Julia Mining Co. to the effect that a drift was to be run connecting the Julia shaft with the Tunnel, and that Julia had acquired the title of the Tunnel Co., within the boundaries of the Julia claim, are confirmed at the office of the Tunnel Co., with some slight modifications in details. Julia is to pay the Tunnel Co. one hundred thousand dollars, of which twenty thousand is to be paid down, and the balance monthly, as the work progresses, at the rate of seventy dollars per foot, the whole amount not to exceed one hundred thousand. The Julia Company will be entitled to draw back the \$70 per foot on the drift to be run by the company from the shaft, to expedite the connection. No definite bargain has been made concerning the requirement of the Tunnel title to the ground by the Julia company, the arrangement in that respect being an open one pending the definite settlement of the Tunnel and Comstock lode. The contract was signed yesterday.

Caufield Held to Answer.

SACRAMENTO, Aug. 23.-Henry A. Caufield, who shot and killed Wm. G. English last week, was examined in the Police Court today and held to answer for murder; bail refused.

A Raid on Campo Apprehended.

SAN DIEGO, Aug. 23.-A letter from Gasqui, Bro. & Campo, enclosing a letter received by them from Lower California warning them that a party of outlaws are committing depredations below the line and intend shortly to raid Campo. Information from other sources corroborates this statement. The banditti are mostly fugitives from justice in California and Sonora. They number between twenty and thirty and are under the leadership of a desperado named Bustamante. When the letter to the Gaskills was written, last Sunday, they were in the vicinity of San Rafael, where they had been committing depredations. The Lower California farmers were called for protection against them. Lieut. Booth and Serg't Patton, of the Signal service were out at Campo day before yesterday and returned last evening. On Wednesday night their camp was attacked by a large party of strange Mexicans, here and kept guard at Campo these banditti kept away from the border, and as soon as that protection was removed they came back again. Horse and cattle stealing on both sides of the border has been of daily occurrence for months past.

The Defuncting Clerks.

SAN FRANCISCO, Aug. 23.-In the Police Court today, in the case of H. M. Clark, the Clerk of the City Criminal Court, charged with embezzling funds of the Court, the Judge said the case was a peculiar one, but he felt it his duty to hold Clark to answer, with bail fixed at \$3,000.

Relief for Yellow Fever Sufferers.

ST. LOUIS, Aug. 23.-John E. Long, late Collector of this port, has sent a check to Mayor Overton for \$500 to be distributed equally among the fever stricken people of Memphis, Vicksburg, Jackson, Grenada and New Orleans. The Hebrew Young Men's Literary Association has raised about \$1,500 and sent \$500 each to the Howard Association at Memphis, Vicksburg and Grenada.

The Labor Investigating Committee.

NEW YORK, Aug. 23.-The Labor Investigating Committee resumed its session this morning. Horace White was called by the committee and stated that he had handled the financial question and had paid a great deal of attention to it. He thought that the present commercial crisis was only one of a series that have occurred among nations for the past two hundred years and that they have been produced by rampant speculation. In 1873 he thought that speculations in railroads had a great deal to do with causing the depression which existed. There were enormous speculations in lands all over the country. Prices of real estate multiplied beyond anything in the recollection of the witness. Obligations incurred by the building of these railroads and the purchase of real estate finally caused many parties to become insolvent. The condition of the currency had not increased this state of things. These periods of crises came upon nations, no matter whether currency is gold or paper. The speculation era which existed from '69 to '73, witness thought, had something to do with the present condition of affairs. The over-production by machines had contributed to decrease business by producing more than there was a demand for, and prices fell accordingly.

Potter Investigation Committee.

WASHINGTON, Aug. 23.-In response to a question from Butler, Burke stated that none of the Parokard Legislature who were known to have been elected by minority vote were allowed to become members of the Nicholls Legislature. Witness further said that, although the reports of the visiting statesmen to the United States Senate stated that the Nicholls government was founded in bloodshed and riots, such statements were unfounded and he (Burke) did not propose to square their reports for them.

Contributions to Boston.

BOSTON, Aug. 23.-At noon today contributions here for yellow fever sufferers amounted to \$3,000. Joe Hooker has his say.

BOSTON, Aug. 23.-The Herald publishes an interview with General Joe Hooker at Martha's Vineyard in which he is reported to have said relative to the disputed battle of Lookout Mountain, "When General Grant affirms that there was no battle on Lookout Mountain, or when he otherwise detracts from the successes of my battle, he either must have been deep in the cup to which he is addicted, or else the desire for the third term must have crazed his brain. In no other way can I account for a commanding general going back on himself and going back on the army which made him. Grant's opinions in regard to the war are far from being infallible, the same as when he administered the affairs of the National Government. My battles were not so bloody as his, hence I suppose he is not able to appreciate them. As to the battle of Lookout Mountain, there are too many witnesses to that battle to have it ignored at this late day, and the friends of the fallen will not be likely to accept Grant's verdict in regard to the fight. I need say no more."

Aid Subscriptions to New York - A case of Yellow Fever at Brooklyn.

NEW YORK, Aug. 23.-Mayor Ely this morning received \$282 in small subscriptions to aid the Ladies' Elastic Gaiters, Schult Brooklyn, a yellow fever patient, who was removed to the Quarantine Hospital Wednesday, died last night. Schult is supposed to have contracted the disease while unloading a cargo of logwood last Saturday.

Not a Legal Body.

NEW YORK, Aug. 23.-Major Burke, testifying before the Potter Committee today, said he considered all acts of the Louisiana Returning Board illegal, as the Board was not a legally constituted body.

New Orleans.

NEW ORLEANS, Aug. 23.-New cases, 123; deaths, 40.

Garibaldi as a Socialist.

LONDON, Aug. 23.-General Garibaldi has written a letter denouncing Austria and Germany, and approving Socialism.

The Russian Insurrection.

VIENNA, Aug. 23.-The loss of the Russian at Serajewo was three hundred killed and seven hundred wounded. It is thought that many in addition were carried away by their friends. The Austrian wounded number three hundred.

Appointed Commander-in-Chief.

VIENNA, Aug. 23.-An Imperial order names General Philippovich Commander-in-Chief of the Twelfth Corps; the Grand Duke of Wurttemberg, commander of the 13th corps; Gen. Ramberg, commander of the 5th corps; Gen. Szapary, commander of the 3d corps; and Gen. Benert commander of the 4th corps. These corps, numbering 180,000 men, are from the second army. This development of military force seems principally directed against Serbia and Montenegro, where participation in the insurrection is manifested.

Reforming the Egyptian Government.

ALEXANDRIA, Aug. 23.-A project is under consideration which it is believed the Khedive will accept to-morrow, whereby Nubar Pasha will become President of the Council and Rivers Wilson Minister of Finance. The Khedive and his family will restore all their lands to the State and a comprehensive scheme for the reform of the administration including large re-arrangements in the civil list will be commenced.
