Passengers Going South.

Duncan in Court-The Clay Street Bank becoming President.

SAN FRANCISCO, Aug. 24.-In the Municipal Criminal Court to-day, the case of J. C. Duncan, of the defunct Pioneer Bank, came up on demurrer, on eighteen charges. On fourteen of these, viz: eight cases of falsifying accounts and six cases of forgery of certificates of the Safe Deposit Company's stock, demurrers were sustained on account of technical errors in the indictments, which will be referred to the Grand Jury for further consideration. In two cases of forgery of Safe Deposit certificates, one case of grand larceny and one case of felony, demurrers were overruled.

As a prudential measure, the Clay Street Bank is demanding regular time notice from depositors desiring to withdraw their accounts.

Fatal Accident to a Light-House Keeper.

SAN FRANCISCO, Aug. 24.-E. K. Barnum, keeper of the lighthouse on the South Farallone Islands, came to the city last evening on a visit and called at the home of a friend on the southeast corner of Front and Vallejo streets. While there he fell down stairs and sustained injuries which resulted in his death in an hour after the fall. The Coroner was notified and took charge of the body.

Fall Down a shaft.

SONORA, Cal., Aug. 24.-Yesterday morning about 10 o'clock Michael Ryan, Superintendent of the New Albany mine, near Summersville, was killed by falling down a shaft about 90 feet. His body struck and lodged on some timbers across the shaft. The remains were brought to Sonora last night, and will be buried to-morrow.

Freight Contract Extended.

NEW YORK, August 24.-The freight contract between the Pacific Mail Steamship Company and the Union Pacific Railroad, which would have terminated the last day of this month, has been extended for sixty days longer on the same basis.

New Orleans.

NEW ORLEANS, Aug. 24.-New cases, 193; deaths, 42. Hugh Irvine, chief operator of the Western Union Telegraph office of this city, died this morning of yellow fever after six days of illness.

Memphis.

MEMPHIS, Aug. 24.-The fever is largely on the increase, and matters look quite panicky again this morning. The applications from the poor to be sent out of the city are numerous. For the twenty-four hours ending at noon, 105 new cases have been reported and 15 deaths. Of the new cases about 75 have been reported this morning. A scarcity of nurses is beginning to be felt, especially of females.

San Jose - Mrs. Robinson Returns.

NEW YORK, Aug. 24.-It is reported that all differences between the California Central and Pacific Railroads and the Pacific Mail Steamship Company, about freight and passenger contracts, were settled last evening, and matters will continue to work harmoniously as heretofore.

Mrs. Ralston, widow of the California banker, arrived from Europe yesterday, accompanied by two of her children. She is here to look after her interest in the estate of Mr. Ralston.

Dr. N. R. Davis, of the Pacific Mail service, died here yesterday, aged 53. He was for many years in charge of the United States Marine Hospital at San Francisco.

The Hard Times Investigation.

NEW YORK, Aug. 24.-J. J. Henchman, of Brooklyn, gave his views to the Labor Congressional Committee. He did not think the depression of business was so great as reported, and he believed that the Government should not interfere by legislation. We have altered our manners of life and now absorb the attention of the Legislature of the organic law to meet the changed condition of the age in which we live. An overstocked market means a commercial crisis with all its attendant phenomena, and declining prices, idle manufacturing and distress among the operatives. The only remedy for this is to wait until consumption catches up with production again.

F. B. Thurber, a merchant of this city, testified that he believed the primary causes of the ills of which both laboring and other classes are complaining are the development of steam and electricity which, in connection with labor-saving machinery, have, within a comparatively few years, revolutionized production and commerce.

The Potter Investigation.

NEW YORK, Aug. 24.-The Potter Committee continued its investigation to-day. J. R. Gaultreary, of New Orleans, who had charge of the Registration Bureau in 1874, testified that his Bureau ascertained that the number of fraudulent registrations in New Orleans amounted to 13,000, and admitted he had made against \$400. Witness said many of the Republican supervisors were non-residents, fugitives from justice, and in several cases, were under indictment. He said he had a conversation with Judge Dibble, who made the remark that he and Burke were foolish to work for the

Democracy, for, if they had a majority of 20,000, they would be counted out by the Returning Board.

Witness referred to a sewing machine circular, on which he said the Republicans made their registration lists, and said that when Major Burke and himself protested to the Returning Board against this fraud, they were laughed at. He then gave the names of a large number of those who manipulated the late election, all of whom now hold federal offices, including J. Madison Wells and Thos. C. Anderson. Witness admitted that he belonged to an organization known as the White League had turned out with them and borne arms. The object of the League was to protect themselves against the machinations of men who wanted to encroach upon their rights as citizens and to take their property from them. The organization was still in existence, and numbered from 700 to 1,000.

Battle with Crooked Distillers.

NASHVILLE, Tenn., Aug. 24.-The Revenue officers report an engagement with an armed band of illicit distillers in Auburn county, headed by Campbell Morgan, at 6 M. yesterday. The Revenue officers were under fire for forty-five minutes, and Phillips, Pippen and Smith were wounded. Commissioner Raum has given Collector Woodcock authority to send enough men to capture the entire band. They are getting up a posse for that purpose.

Chicago Makes a Subscription.

CHICAGO, Aug. 24.-Subscription aggregating \$2,500 were made in the Board of Trade this morning for the benefit of yellow fever cities of the South.

An Escapade in the Deadwood Jail.

DEADWOOD, D. T., Aug. 24.-Shortly before noon to-day, as Jailor Manning unlocked the door of the main cell of the city jail, the prisoners, acting on a preconcerted plan, made a dash for liberty. The jailor was knocked down and the prisoners all succeeded in getting outside of the jail yard before an alarm was given. Under Sheriff Mahan and deputies, assisted by a large number of citizens, were quickly on hand and began a hot pursuit of the jail birds, who had taken to the mountains. The chase was so well managed that in less than an hour all the prisoners excepting one were recaptured. Several were fired but no one injured. The prisoners recaptured were White and Kieser, horse thieves, and Dale and Martin, cattle thieves. Bell, the alleged murderer of Chas. Lee, did not attempt to escape.

Eastern News.

LONDON, Aug. 24.-The Deutsche Zeitung announces that a difference has arisen between the Porte and Austria of a nature to retard the conclusion of the Commission.

PESTHE, Aug. 24.-The city authorities have refused to execute a military order making a requisition for 500 wagons.

Political News from Berlin.

BERLIN, Aug. 24.-Negotiations between Mgr. Massella, the Papal Nuncio, and Prince Bismarck, have led to no result whatever. The Reichstag will therefore continue to oppose the Government in the Reichstag.

Friendly Demonstrations.

VIENNA, Aug. 24.-A political correspondence says that the most friendly demonstrations passed between Austria and Servia on the occasion of the celebration of Servian Independence. Emperor Francis Joseph has assured Prince Milan that he and the Servians might rely upon the most cordial support of Austria in all matters affecting their welfare.

A Prophet and King Killed.

ROME, Aug. 24.-Lazzarotti, the fanatic of Grosseto, who proclaimed himself prophet and king, was killed at the head of 3,000 followers, who first fired upon the Generals after they had been ordered to disperse.

A New Russian Loan.

ST. PETERSBURG, Aug. 24.-A new five per cent loan of three hundred million rubles is announced. The issue price is 93. The Russian Imperial Bank undertakes to issue the loan.
