Fire in the Lumber at Chico.

CHICO, Cal., Oct. 28.—The ash and door factory of the Sierra Plume Co. took fire this morning about 9:30 o'clock, and in less than half an hour the building fell in. All the machinery and a considerable part of the stock prove a total loss. A few hands were at work dressing lumber when the fire broke out. A large force of citizens is trying to save the lumber piles, but a large quantity will necessarily be destroyed.

SECOND DISPATCH.

The lumber piles are now in a blaze, and the fire is beyond control and will have to burn itself out. It is impossible to estimate the loss. There is no adjacent property that it can damage.

A Robbery of Nearly Three Millions.

NEW YORK, Oct. 28.—The Manhattan Savings Institution was, on the morning of Sunday the 27th, robbed of securities to the amount of \$2,767,700, of which \$2,605,700 were in the name of the institution and are not negotiable. The sum of \$188,000 is made payable to the institution, \$78,000 in coupon bonds, and \$110,000 in cash.

About Southern Terrorism.

NEW YORK, Oct. 28th.—The Tribune, reviewing its special from the South, says: The persecution of Republicans continues in South Carolina. Two Republican leaders have been shut up in jail to keep them from holding meetings. A meeting in Louisiana was broken up by an armed mob and, in one of the counties of Texas, the Democrats will not permit any political activity whatever on the part of their opponents. The state of things in South Carolina, as described by an old Union soldier, shows that this state, as well as others, is to be carried at the coming election by military power.

The Halifax award.

NEW YORK, Oct. 28th.—The World's Montreal special says: If the American Government should refuse to settle the Halifax award, the Canadian Government will put into an awkward position, and for the responsibility for this is thrown upon Newfoundland, there will be trouble, perhaps, of a serious character with the maritime provinces.

The Gigantic Robbery.

NEW YORK, Oct. 28th.—The gigantic robbery of the Manhattan Savings Institution is the sensation in banking circles. Notice has been posted in the bank advising that for the purpose of preventing loss to depositors, it is ordered that no payments be made without the sixty days' notice, and that the surplus of the bank is more than sufficient to cover any probable loss that may be sustained by reason of robbery. A great number of depositors have given the necessary notice. The directors were in secret session today. It is said to be a rule for judgment of bank buildings in this city to have the combination of vaults. Every available detective in the town has been assigned to the case, so far as can be ascertained. No arrests have been made yet. Superintendent Walling said this morning that he could give no new information about the case, and denied that he suspected last night to have a clue to the robbery. He had one, he said, he would not admit it. The stor and night watchmen are at the bank to-day helping to straighten out matters. Augustus Schell says the bank would have a surplus of \$600,000 if the coupon bonds stolen were counted as lost. Great crowds continued all the morning about the bank. The robbers left behind a skeleton key, also three pairs of handcuffs. Of forty or fifty boxes stored away about twenty had been opened and their contents rifled. It is possible that the amount taken may be more than three million, since the contents of a number of the boxes, containing gold and Government bonds, with which the sides of the vault were lined, had disappeared.

A Fund for the Noble Officer's Family.

NEW YORK, Oct. 28.—Postmaster James announces that contributions for the relief of the yellow fever sufferers made at the post-office during the next three days will be added to the fund to be held in trust for the widow and children of Lieut. Benner, U. S. A., who died while in charge of the relief steamer, J. M. Chambers.

Memphis.

MEMPHIS, Oct. 28.—Last night was the coldest of the season. A heavy frost fell and ice lined the streets throughout the city. The Board of Health will to-morrow officially announce the safety of refugees returning to the city, but will recommend that all dwellings be thoroughly ventilated before occupied. From 6 o'clock last night until noon to-day six orders for interments were reported by undertakers. This includes deaths both in the city and suburbs.

A Proclamation of War to Come.

LONDON, Oct. 28.—A special from Dajdeling says the expected proclamation of war against the Ameer of Afghanistan will be gazetted shortly, specifying in full the reasons which decided the Government to declare war. It is stated that a number of border tribes whom the Ameer summoned to Ali Mujlo have again dispersed in consequence of the scarcity of supplies.

A Vienna dispatch reports that four companies of relief, which were the only Turkish forces in the district when the Bulgarian rising at Macedonia began, were totally destroyed by the insurgents on the 18th. Six battalions have been sent to reinforce the garrison at Seres.

German Intelligence.

LONDON, Oct. 28th.—A dispatch from Berlin reports that Herr Hoffmann, President of the Imperial Chancellerie, has tendered his resignation. Emperor William appears determined to resume the government instead of spending the Winter in Italy, as his physicians advise.

A Five Million Dollar Future in Scotland.

GLASGOW, Oct. 28.—The liabilities of John Jones, Wright & Company are over five million dollars; assets comparatively meagre. The Glasgow house only will be sold, both Wright and Scott having retired from the London and Glasgow concerns after the failure of the City of Glasgow Bank.

Spain in a Warlike Mood.

WASHINGTON, D. C., Oct. 28.—Private letters received here from Madrid indicate that the Spanish Government anticipates a general European war growing out of the Eastern complications and is preparing to take part in it, if necessary to protect her Mediterranean interests. Now that Cuba is at peace, Spain claims the ability to put one hundred thousand men into the European field should emergency require it. In the meantime the mission to Constantinople has been raised to the first class and will probably be filled by the Marquis Mantillo, who is now at Madrid on leave.
