Irretrievable Financial Evils.

There are some evils which hardly admit of remedy. We have been amused at the claims to honesty made by the advocates of hard money. The fact is that the people of the United States have suffered from a series of infamous robberies, done at the dictation of the capitalist classes, almost without parallel. But the question is not as to the equity of the matter, but whether we are not in the condition of Macbeth, who had waded into the middle of the stream, and to whom returning were as weary a work as to go on.

Nothing could more conclusively confirm the wisdom of the California Legislature in establishing a branch of the Supreme Court for Southern California at Los Angeles than such an exhibit. It is worthy of remark that the litigation in this district is of a complex and important kind, embracing questions of irrigation and land law which test the patience and learning of the Judges to the utmost. It is in the face of such an exhibit as this that Mr. Edgerton had the effrontery to propose, and the Judiciary Committee of the Constitutional Convention to recommend, the adoption of a constitutional provision fixing the Supreme Court at the State Capital. It is a vain task to attempt to arrest the course of development which, notwithstanding the legion of croakers of this section, is trending steadily southward. A trip through the old-time prosperous counties of Northern California is a melancholy experience. The population, money and litigation have set their faces in this direction. It is not in the power of any sectional favoritism to arrest the tide. To undo the work of the last Legislature in making a solitary concession to this section would be regarded by the whole of Southern California as an outrage.

From the skeleton returns of the elections received up to this writing it is evident that the Republicans have gained a scattered Congressional district here and there, while the Democrats have made material gains. As we expected, we have lost in New York through a quarrel in our ranks. Ben Butler is beaten in Massachusetts. The National Labor and Greenback party have cut a very insignificant figure in all elections. We see nothing to change our estimate of some months ago, which gave the Republicans in the next House of Representatives from one hundred and ten to one hundred and twenty-five members. This will be a heavy loss to that party. One thing may be relied upon—the news will steadily improve for the Democracy. That is always the way.

To again plunge into issuing irredeemable greenbacks would be a remedy for nothing. There are some financial injuries of the character of that which is sustained by a man who has had his leg or arm cut off. It helps the poor fellow nothing to put himself in a posture in which he may have his remaining arm or leg cut off. It is the long-headed and sagacious who always profit by ill-judged tampering with the currency, and it is always the people who, in the end, foot the bills. Were we to plunge again into an unlimited issue of greenbacks, we should have to pass through another crisis, of which the moneyed classes would again reap the benefits.

The exception to which we alluded above is in regard to the National banks. There is no earthly obstacle to winding all these institutions up, retiring their issues and replacing them by a similar amount of greenbacks. There is a tangible benefit to be derived by the people from such a course because it would save somewhere in the neighborhood of eighteen million dollars interest which is yearly paid on the bonds which are used as a basis for the circulation of the National banks. It cannot be pretended that the greenback is not as good as the National bank note, and the saving of interest to the people should be conclusive of the matter.

To our appreciation of the drift of the elections so far held show that no extreme financial projects can hope for a sanction by the people. To place their action upon the plans of honesty is sheer leather and prunella. Their attitude is grounded purely upon expediency and common sense. The capitalists of the United States have accumulated against themselves a mass of equities which would justify almost any amount of reprisals on the part of the defrauded people. But, in declaring for a policy of vengeance, the people would wield a double-edged sword which would cut themselves as badly as their adversaries. A universal perception of this fact has left the greenback party pure and simple with but a corporal's guard of followers even in Indiana.

Had Ben Butler proven to have been elected (governor of Massachusetts yesterday the greenbackers would have claimed it as a victory over the Free-Soilers. Nothing could be more absurd. Whatever the vote polled by Butler, fully five-eighths of it were Democratic ballots, and with a view of breaking the arrogance of the Republican ring which has so long lorded it in the Bay State.

Supreme Court Session.

We have taken the trouble to collect some statistics concerning the Los Angeles term of the Supreme Court this Fall as compared with the approaching Sacramento Term. The facts derived from the printed calendar, are interesting as throwing light on the sublimity of the Judiciary Committee of the Constitutional Convention, which seeks to establish the Supreme Court irremovably at Sacramento.
