Late Telegrams.

Attempted Assassination of the Mayor of Tombstone.

TOMBSTONE, Dec. 15.—A dastardly attempt was made last night to assassinate John P. Clum, Mayor of Tombstone. Since the late tragedy here it has been known that Boston threatened the lives of Mayor Clum, Marshall Williams, agent of Wells, Fargo & Co., Thomas Fitch, Judge Spicer, Earl brothers and Holliday.

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WASHINGTON, Dec. 15.—Secretary Blaine will give a reception to his successor, Secretary Frelinghuysen, on Monday evening, on which occasion the diplomatic corps will be present.

BOSTON, Dec. 15.—It has been determined to re-count the votes for Reppy, Mr. Clum's partner in the Epitaph, started out about three o'clock this morning, but returned without getting any clue to the robbers. The news was brought to town by the up stage, about two o'clock this morning, when an additional force, consisting of Messrs. Behan, Reppy, Sorin, Kirk and one other man left in pursuit. Mr. Sorin went to the cemetery, where he found out the perpetrators.

WASHINGTON, Dec. 15.—The Chilean minister, Hatten, authorizes the following ruling: No supplement containing any advertisement whatever can be allowed in mails at second-class rates unless the publisher makes affidavit that the same rates are paid for advertisements in the supplement that are paid for in the body of the paper itself.

WASHINGTON, Dec. 15.—The committee have finally unanimously agreed to recommend the passage of Sherman's three-per-cent funding bill, with amendments reducing the aggregate of three-per-cent bonds to be issued to two hundred million dollars, and providing that, in the event of default, the bonds shall not be any time exceed twenty-five million dollars. The committee took this action after hearing Secretary Folger, who expressed himself in opposition to the proposition, preferring to retain the Government privilege of calling in 3 1/2 per cent at any time.

PHILADELPHIA, Pa., Dec. 15.—At the annual meeting of the National Council of the Union League of America to-day the present officers were re-elected.

CHICAGO, Dec. 15.—A Times's special from San Antonio, reports that President Del Norte on the North Rio Grande, says: Chief Arrogant and thirty of his tribe, the main remnant of Victoria's band, were captured by Mexican troops. The Chief and several bucks were shot. Three Indians were killed in making the capture.

CHICAGO, Dec. 15.—W. W. O'Brien, a noted criminal lawyer, falling down a stairway opening in the sidewalk last night.

ST. LOUIS, Dec. 15.—Julius Reuter and wife (colored) were shown out of the Grand Opera House parquette last night, and their money refunded. Reuter, who is the principal of a school, will institute proceedings against the proprietor.

WASHINGTON, Dec. 15.—Scoville delivered a lecture on Guiteau last evening. Many tickets were sold but the attendance was small. Scoville was received in a respectful and friendly manner. He found no fault with the Court, but claimed that public opinion had prejudiced the case. He

thought there was great danger of Guiteau being killed before the trial is over. At the close of his address recollections of sympathy with the family of the prisoner were adopted and complimenting Scoville upon his management of the case.

Outcast Solicitors as to the Welfare of the Jury.

WASHINGTON, Dec. 15th.—As soon as the Court was called to order Guiteau addressed the Court and said: "I want to make a little speech. It will be a great misfortune if anything should happen to this jury. They are very honest, intelligent men, and I want the best care taken of them. There are some of them who are not accustomed to good, wholesome food, and consequently they are liable to have indigestion. I want the Court to order them out every morning before breakfast for a walk, four or five miles, I have two or three more little speeches to make, but this will do for the present." Judge—"The Court will attend to the wants of the jury."

Collier, the recalled witness, said he never detected any signs of insanity in the prisoner. Scoville began to cross-examine the witness, when Guiteau, in great rage, shouted: "I never saw this man but once in my life, and that was in 1878. I never saw him but five minutes. What does he know about me? This shows just how little sense you have got, Corkhill, to put up with this man as an expert. To Scoville: "And you haven't got common horse-sense, to waste time cross-examining his character. He was only a clerk in a lawyer's office anyway." The witness, in reply to Corkhill, stated: "In my opinion, the only man I know him to be perfectly competent to distinguish between right and wrong." Scoville excepted to the statement.

Late Irish News.

DUBLIN, Dec. 13.—A meeting was held to-day at the Mansion House to organize a committee of land-owners and city magistrates in support of the Irish Property-Defense Association. It is understood that a resolution was carried appointing a committee to obtain subscriptions on behalf of boycotted persons unable to gather their crops. The proceedings of the meeting were remarkably harmonious. The political aspect of the Irish question was, by mutual consent, avoided, by the advice of English sympathizers with Ireland. O'Donnell attempted to gain admission. The Lord Mayor refused to admit him, not being invited. O'Donnell sent a protest, stating that the Lord Mayor was doubtless right in preventing the voice of even a single representative of the Irish people being raised in a packed meeting of city magistrates and friends of rack renters, who were preparing to render the Land Act a dead letter by presenting for the immediate payment of arrears in a famine season. Gladstone sent a telegram, saying the movement was a justifiable one, but that obviously the Government could not give any further advice on the subject. The Duke of Westminster subscribed £400 and promised another subscription if further help was required.

A party of armed men last month entered the house of Mrs. Renare, near Letowall, threatening to shoot her for giving information to the police. Her children drove themselves upon their mother, and one received a charge of shot in the legs. Six of the party were arrested and five were sentenced to five years each of penal servitude. The man who shot the Earl of Dunraven's tenants paid their arrears of rent and have accepted 33 per cent reduction, conditional upon the new valuation of the land.

The Treasurer of the Ladies' Land League announces that the receipts for the past week for the "producers' fund amount to £1,150, and for the general fund £224.

The Queen has contributed £2,200 to the relief of Irish ladies. Tobin, arrested in connection with the Fenian and Land League movement, has been committed for trial on charges of treason, felony and conspiracy.

BIRMINGHAM, December 13.—The Reform League passed resolutions expressing indignation at the imprisonment, without trial, of 354 patriotic Irishmen.

LONDON, Dec. 13.—The World says: It is reported in Irish legal circles that the law officers of the Crown have been considering the advisability of indicting R. P. O'Connor and Healy for conspiracy on their arrival in England. The party took in the proceedings of the Land League Convention in Chicago is relied upon as sufficient to insure their conviction.
