Late Telegrams.

The Tombstone Victim—More Maritime Disasters.

TOMBSTONE, A. T., March 23.—The coroner's jury find that Morgan Earp came to his death at the hands of Frank Stillwell, (who was killed next day in Tucson), Pete Spence, one Freis, and two half-breed Indians. Pete Spence's wife exposes the plot.

A Sheriff's posse, consisting of 20 men, mostly cow-boys, left this morning for the Dragon mountains, where the Earps are supposed to be at present. The Sheriff made a weak attempt to arrest them at the Cosmopolitan Hotel before they left, but Wyatt Earp told him he didn't want to see him; that he had seen him once too often, and thereupon the Earp party mounted their horses and rode away. There is a very noisy feeling among the cow-boy element, as the Earps are rendered desperate by the attempted assassination of Virgil Earp and the cold-blooded murder of Morgan Earp.

A Budget of Interesting Items from Washington.

WASHINGTON, March 23.—Among the Senate confirmations is that of Samuel Bluffhard, of New York, as Associate Justice of the Supreme Court.

ARTHUR WILL NOT VETO THE CHINESE BILL.

June, of Nevada, was asked this evening whether he credited the report that the President was disposed to veto the Chinese bill. "No," replied the Senator. "Some of our people are apprehending a veto, but I am not. My confidence does not spring from anything the President has said to me, but from my knowledge of the opinion he entertains concerning the exercise of the veto power. If the President thinks the term of twenty years in the restrictive clause of the pending measure strains the treaty, he might drop that provision as a possible ground for his veto but for the fact that the representatives of the people have had the same question before them, and with their eyes open and after full discussion of that very feature, have decided, by a good majority, that it was within the scope of the treaty."

DISCUSSION OF THE CHINESE BILL.

During the consideration of the Chinese bill in the House to-day the measure was discussed by Washburn, Good, McLean, Robinson, Kasson, L. R. Tucker and Hawks. The House at 5:10 P. M. took a recess until 10 to-morrow. Page, of California, gave notice that he would, at 2 P. M. to-morrow demand the previous question on the bill.

SLIPPERY SHEPHERD.

WASHINGTON, March 23.—The examination of Shipperd was resumed this morning before the House Committee on Foreign Relations.

Organization to Retire the Field Officers.

WASHINGTON, March 23.—The following call has been issued to the American people: The President having signed the treaty of the General Conference, and the Senate having ratified the President's action, the American association of the Red Cross, organized under the provisions of said treaty, purposes to send its agents among the sufferers by the flood with a view to ameliorating their condition, so far as can be done by human aid and the means at hand will admit of. Contributions are earnestly solicited. Remittances in money may be sent to Hon. Chas. J. Folger, Secretary of the Treasury and Chairman of the Board of Trustees, or to his associates, Hon. R. T. Lincoln, Secretary of War, and Hon. G. K. Loring, Commissioner of Agriculture. Contributions of wearing apparel, bedding and provisions should be addressed to the Red Cross agent at Memphis, Tennessee; Vicksburg, Mississippi, and Helena, Arkansas.

WASHINGTON, March 23.—The debate on the Chinese bill was continued by Pacheco and Townsend (Ill.) in favor, and Robinson (Mass.) against it. Numerous amendments were then offered, and Page, at 3 o'clock this afternoon, demanded the previous question, which was seconded by a practically unanimous vote. One hour being allowed for closing the debate, Page yielded ten minutes

English and Irish News.

LONDON, March 21.—In the Commons the Marquis of Hartington declared that the closure proposal was nothing more than a modification of the existing restrictions on debate, the effect of which resolution had been greatly exaggerated. The Government was unable, under the present system, to carry on the business of the country with dignity and effect. If other persons thought they could do so, the Ministry would with pleasure resign; but so long as the Ministry remained responsible they must appeal to the House to give them those powers which alone are sufficient for the conduct of business. The debate was then adjourned.

At a meeting of the Irish party of the House of Commons last night it was decided to introduce a bill amending the Land Act and dealing with the Healy clause, in order to set aside the limitation recently imposed by the decision in the Adams-Dunne case. The party decided to vote against the closure measure.

DUBLIN, March 21.—Five suspects were released from Limerick Jail to-day.

Smith, home-rule member of Parliament from Tipperary, announces his intention to support the closure resolutions.

CHILE'S CONDITIONS. NEW YORK, March 22.—Advice from Panama to March 11th are as follows: A Chilean official paper publishes the protocol between Trenton and the Chilean Government. Although it appears without signatures, it is considered authentic. Chile declares that she meant no offense to the United States by the arrest of Calderon. The Chilean Government declares it will not treat with Senator Calderon, and will make peace only on the following conditions: The cessation of Tarapaca in perpetuity; the occupation of Peru as far as Moquegua until an indemnity of \$20,000,000 is paid, and the possession of half of the guano islands of Peru.
