Progress of the Sonora Railroad. TUCSON, April 3.—Information from our agents is to the effect that there are three vessels unloading railroad ties and three more expected. The railroad company is now working at both ends, and the road will probably be completed to Calabassa, Arizona, by the 1st of May.

Death of General Harbitt. NEW YORK, April 3.—General Harbitt, late United States Minister to Peru, died suddenly of disease of the heart, March 28th, at Lima.

Crushed to Death. READING, Pa., April 3.—The wheel of a street car was blown over upon a shed under which a number of persons sought shelter from the storm. George Shelthorne, Rosa Shelthorne and John Cruise were killed. Mrs. Shelthorne was probably fatally hurt. Geo. Hill and Chas. Shelthorne are seriously injured.

Indianapolis, Ind., April 2.—At Kokomo last night, Chas. G. Franklin entered the house of G. Pritchard, chloroformed the family, and took a three-year-old daughter to the out house and outraged her. The wretch was arrested. A crowd surrounds the jail and lynching is threatened. The Sheriff has called on the Governor for aid. The child will probably die.

Steady Violent Work. PUEBLO, Col., April 3.—Three more victims were hanged by the vigilantes. A passing eye witness says that the victims were being dragged toward a thicket by a number of men. The blood was streaming from their mouths and nostrils.

A Wife Murdered. SEWARD, Neb., April 2.—A. C. Patrick shot his wife through the heart last night, and then fired on each of his two sons, slightly wounding one of them. He then made his escape.

Yankton, Dak., April 2.—The Territorial insane asylum was burned this afternoon. It was a temporary wooden building with fifty-four inmates in the asylum. Of these the following were burned to death: Osum Iverson, Peter Peterson, Ivan Lynch and Joseph Haverly. The property lost was valued at about \$10,000.

Terrible Collision of Sea. LONDON, April 3.—The Spanish steamer Yrurac Bat, from Liverpool for Port Rico, came in collision with the mail steamer Dowro, from Brazil, off Cape Finisterre, Spain, Saturday night. Both steamers were sunk. The steamer Hidalgo rescued seventeen persons from the Dowro and six or seven from the Yrurac Bat and landed them at Coruna. Thirty of the crew of the Yrurac Bat, including the captain and pilot, were drowned. Thirty-five of the Dowro's passengers were saved. The number drowned unknown.

A Mysterious Shot. ST. PETERSBURG, April 3.—Sukhanoff, condemned to death at the Nizhny trial, was shot at Cronstadt. His death was instantaneous. Thousands surrounded the spot.

At an isolated ranch near the Vera Cruz line, in the State of Oaxaca, the rancher's wife and four children were brutally murdered for money supposed to be concealed in the dwelling. The perpetrators were captured.

The contract for the dredging of the part of the interoceanic canal between Colon and Gatun, a distance of about eight miles, was awarded last month to Huerns, Slaven & Co.

Laura S Adams cowidher her former husband in Philadelphia Saturday. James R. Pettit (that is his name) lived successfully with Laura's two younger sisters, and recently fell heir to a fortune. When Laura heard of this she bounded Pettit for a liberal allowance and he demurred. Out of this grew the cowidhing. All the sisters belonged to the minor sensational stage.

A moonlight fight at Menipee, Ky., resulted in the shooting of two of the combatants, one mortally, and the laying open of the bowels of a third. It is also believed that a fourth participant was killed and his body carried away.

The hand of Jay Gould appears in a bill that has been introduced in the New York Assembly making the circulation of false statements to affect the stock market a misdemeanor, and placing the burden of proof on the defendant. This new-fashioned crime is to be punishable by a fine of not more than \$5000, or by imprisonment not exceeding three years. Contrary to all established principles of law the accused person in this case is to be presumed guilty of a criminal offense until he shall prove his innocence.

L. E. Ballinger, a prominent politician of Galveston, Tex., died Saturday from the effects of vaccination.

A respite of a fortnight has been granted in Dr. Lamson's case, at the request of President Arthur. Pacheco is trying to pass a bill donating the lands of Camp Independence, Inyo county, for school purposes.

Berry says he is a candidate for Governor. Robert Thomas, examined for the murder of Michael W. Hasset, at Virginia City, was discharged.

Noble Wallingford, charged with arson, at Napa, has been acquitted. Orrin Adams, a lunatic, jumped out of a second-story window on Saturday at Eureka, and drowned in Humboldt Bay.

Capt. John H. Marsh, of the bark Loch Lea, while drunk on Saturday, fell from the third story of a building at Eureka, Cal., and was killed. Oscar Wilde's audiences in San Francisco are falling away. His house Saturday night was thin.

A Fenian Scare. LONDON, April 1.—An extra police force has been placed in the Town Hall at Manchester, because of anonymous Fenian threats to blow it up during the Easter holidays.
