They will soon be repaired. The first through train over the Rio Grande brings two hundred Mormon converts. They are expected to-day.

A New Department.

St. Louis, April 2.—The Legislature passed a bill that no railroad company in this State shall advance freight without first giving twenty days notice of the proposed change, by posting the new schedule in three conspicuous places on each of its freight and passenger depots. The penalty for violation is five hundred dollars.

EVANSVILLE, Ind., April 2.—The indications at this hour are that the whole Democratic city ticket and four, or perhaps five, out of seven Councilmen are elected.
