Superior Politics—The Chronicle's Absurdities

Our esteemed contemporary, the San Francisco Chronicle, in the general wreck of its party, indulges in a sort of political disquisition which can be called, with truth, very gaudy. It has tackled the question of protection in a shape which challenges the contempt of all honest men. All sane observers know that the issue of protection is largely one of locality. If Gen. Hancock had approached all this delicate subject from the standpoint of localities instead of pronouncing it a "local question," he and not Garfield, would have been the President of the United States. While the question of protection has been one of localities, it has never been a local question. There is here a distinction with a tremendous difference. While tariff impost has been upon all the people of the United States alike, the demand for a high tariff proceeds from such States as Pennsylvania, Massachusetts, New England generally, Ohio and Indiana. A failure to diagnose the merely metaphysical aspects of the matter, conjoined to a colonial Republican corruption fund, in our opinion, with the side issue of Koly's treason in New York, made Garfield's success possible. But the aspect of the tariff question suggested by the Chronicle, in a recent article, are absurd to the last degree. They are, in the main, that Ireland relies upon a high protective tariff in the United States to cripple England, through her manufacturers. The Chronicle, in its wisdom, chooses to erect the Democratic party into the Free Trade party, pro freetrade, of the United States. It is somewhat unfortunate for our esteemed contemporary's hypothesis, that while it was the Whig party which was most clamorous for protection without reason, the Democratic party was always the party of incidental protection; in other words, a reasonable protection. The Democratic shibboleth has always been a tariff for revenue with incidental protection merely. The Democratic party, we are able to assure our San Francisco contemporary, will show its devotion to its old-time shibboleth of incidental protection by electing Samuel J. Randall, of Pennsylvania, Speaker of the Forty-Eighth House of Representatives which, like the Forty-fourth, also overwhelmingly Democratic, will signify itself by a course eminently conservative as respects all the essential manufacturing interests of the United States. The Forty-Eighth Congress, instead of applying itself to disorganizing the business interests of the United States will, under Randall's skillful leadership, devote itself to conserving them, in the future as in the past.

We learn from a gentleman who was at San Luis Rey a few days ago, that the thermometer registered 100° in the shade at that place.

Farmers near Newport and at Westminster report the artesian wells failing. Many have ceased flowing entirely and pumps have to be used to bring the water to the surface. As there is no prospect of the falling wells being restored before the rainy season, some of them will be bored deeper in hope of striking stronger streams.

Last Monday evening the members of Sedgewick Post, G. A. R., held a meeting, at which they decided not to give an entertainment before Decoration Day.

A committee was appointed to make the arrangements for the Decoration Day parade, which was promised to be the most imposing ever held in Santa Ana.

The prospect for a heavy grape crop in this valley was never so good at this season as at present. Almost every vineyard has received one or two heavy irrigations, and the vines are putting out freely. Now that the time for frost has past, nothing but something now unknown can interfere with the yield.

The Hill Investigation

WASHINGTON, April 23.—Supervising Architect Hill has requested Secretary Folger to push as much as possible the pending investigation into the affairs of his office, as he is desirous of having all imputations of his character growing out of the charges removed. Secretary Folger has not yet received a reply from Mr. Murch in regard to the resignation of Fifth Auditor Alexander as a member of the committee and Mr. J. S. Blair as special counsel to act in presenting the charges.

MILWAUKEE (Wis.), April 23.—Kate Kane, of Milwaukee, the female lawyer who threw water in Judge Malloy's face in revenge for an alleged insult during the session of court lately, was again before the public today, her case coming up before Judge Hamilton of the Circuit Court on writ of certiorari, calling for a review of United States Commissioner Ryan's action in releasing her from the county jail on habeas corpus proceedings, because she was confined on Judge Malloy's word only and the papers of commitment were not made for an hour afterwards. Judge Hamilton continued the case till Monday.
